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HAND IN HAND



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CHIKANKARI EMBROIDERY


here is a story that goes around that, a traveler who passed through Lucknow, taught a certain peasant who had given him water when he was very thirsty, so that he would never remain hungry in life.

Earlier chikankari was done on white yarn or colourless muslin and it was called Tanzeb. But today chikankari embroidery work is carried on all fabrics like georgette, chiffon and cotton.

There are different stories behind chikankari's origins. Some say it has been derived from a Persian word chakin or chakeen which means creating delicate patterns on a fabric. Few others feel that, it is a distorted version of chikeen or sequin, a coin valuing Rs.4 for which the work was sold. Some feel the word

has its origin from the Bengal word 'chikan' meaning fine. Chikankari embroidery work basically involves steps like cutting, stitching, printing, embroidery, washing and finishing.

Mostly done by women, this Lucknow embroidery work involves creepers or floral motifs. Flat stiches, embossed stitches and jalli stitches are used. Various stages and procedures are followed to get a chikan garment. First, the fabric is cut according to the size of the garment by the tailor. This is followed by some basic pre-embroidery work so that the block printer gets the correct shape for further placement of the design. The design is printed on the semi-stitched with fugitive colours and the embroidery of the garment is then begun. The washing takes place in a bhatti and dried. Then the garment is starched and ironed. Depending upon the



design and embroidery procedures the entire process can take around one to six months. Basically there are 32 stiches in chikankari. Each stitch in a chikan work sticks on to the purpose for it is meant and they are not replaced by any other stitch. For example, the chain stitch will be used for the final outline of a leaf, petal or stem. Tepchi is a long running stitch. Bakhiya or shadow work is one of the stitches of chikankari. Hool is a fine detached eyelet stitch. Murri is the form of stitch used to embroider the centre of the flowers in chikan work. GI status for chikankari was given in 2008 which recognized Lucknow as an exclusive hub of chikankari

Pop icon Madonna is supposed to have worn a chikankari embroidery work in 2000 stretches. The chikankari work is exported to many European countries. Spegel (American direct marketing company), Heine (a German fashion brand) are among the leading buyers.

Abu Jani and Sandeep Khosla, India's prominent fashion designers have in fact got Judi Dench of James Bond series to wear one of their majestic chikankari creations, upfront to receive an Oscar in 2004 Academy Awards.

In 1986, Indian Film, Anjuman directed by Muzaffar Ali, starring Shabana Azmi and Farooq Shaikh is set in Lucknow and deals with issues of chikan workers.

There are about 2.5 lakhs artisans associated with this art. ◆

SUGAR JEWELLERY

MAKING JEWELLERY OUT OF SUGAR BALLS IN MAHARASHTRA IS A TRADITION THAT SPREADS SWEETNESS AND LOVE AND HELPS THE JEWELLERY MAKERS TO HONE THEIR CREATIVITY, INSTILL SELF-RESPECT AND MAKE THEM ECONOMICALLY INDEPENDENT AT THE SAME TIME. BY KHURSHEED DINSHAW







n earlier days when farm produce would be brought home, the new bride wore a black saree. This was done for two reasonswearing black protects against the evil eye and since the produce was brought during winter, wearing black helped the bride to stay warm as it not only absorbs but also retains heat. The white sugar jewellery stood out on her sari while she welcomed the produce home.

The technique for creating this jewellery which is also known as halwa jewellery involves making elaborate ornaments from intricately woven, tiny balls of sugar. This jewellery making is actually a tradition that is passed down from generation to generation, a custom that is carried forward in various households all over the state. In olden days it was as common as passing down one's cooking recipes to one's daughters. Today however younger generation prefers to buy the readymade jewellery rather than sit and make it themselves. And who can blame them for it takes up to four hours just to make the sugar balls from which the jewellery is then made.

It takes 4-5 days to make a single handmade

set. Before the advent of cooking gas, halwa jewellery was made on a smoky kerosene stove. And since there was no instant glue in those days, glue was made using thick sugar syrup. In those times, mostly the female members of the family would make sugar jewellery at home for their personal use and that jewellery was edible. With non edible sets available in the market, edible halva jewellery is done separately on dry fruits and sesame.

Either one can make the sugar balls on their own or buy sugar balls that are sold in the market can be strung together with thread to make simple necklaces for those interested in trying their hand at this craft. Heavier jewellery is made with cashews, almonds, coconut and peanuts. For making light jewellery sets, sesame is used. Many women, who specialize in this jewellery making, take bulk orders from shops who stock it. They make the jewellery in their privacy. Those who do it on a full time basis work the entire year round (except the monsoons) where they prepare sections of the jewellery and as the time to sell the jewellery approaches, assemble it all together to form these stunning sets.

Society's perception has also changed over the years. A few decades ago, halva jewellery was unheard of as a business venture. It was common for personal household use. People would look down upon those who sold sugar jewellery and assume that they were doing it to tide over some sort of financial difficulty at home. Today, people see it as a creative pursuit and refer to them as sugar jewellery specialists.

A basic set comprise a necklace, bangles, bindi and earrings, while more elaborate ones come with 16 accessories right from anklets, bindis, waist bands, amulets, nose rings, toe rings, earrings, necklaces and bangles in two different designs each. Contemporary designs that are simpler, more modern, elegant and can be worn even to office or get to gethers have been introduced in recent times. Around 60 jewellery designs for kids, women and grooms/ son-in-laws are available.

For grooms' bouquets, wrist-watches, garlands, rings, decorated coconuts, mobile phone and pen sets are available.

Among Maharashtrians an elephant is considered a symbol of prosperity and a stuffed one complete with dry fruits and a bedecked trunk adorned with a sugar jewellery garland is considered auspicious. For kids (boys) the Shri Krishna set of arm and waist bands, mukut or crown and flute with a garland is available.

For girls there is the set consisting of a waistband, armband, anklet, bangles, pendant and a tiara all made from sugar. For kids various designs on white paper whether it is the crowns or bands are traced, then covered with coloured paper and decorated with sugar balls along the edges. To make the creations more attractive sequins, mirrors, stars, golden thread and coloured lace are also stuck on them.

To cater to the demand, machine made halva jewellery is also offered though the handmade one sells more in comparison to the other. Another innovative option that is available is the inclusion of beads coated with sugar. This helps to avoid wastage as the set can be used even after the sugar is removed.

Though sugar jewellery is primarily worn on Makar Sankranti by newlyweds and babies up to a year, it can be worn for special family occasions like weddings, anniversaries and pujas. It is all a matter of personal tastes. The jewellery needs to be wrapped in butter paper and stored in an airtight plastic container. It should not be exposed or opened during the monsoon season as the sugar melts owing to the moisture and humidity in the air. With proper care the sets last for about 6 months. •

Castor oil is a great antibacterial agent and is the best for cleaning skin. Other oils to use include olive (perfect for all skin types), jojoba (perfect for all skin types), avocado (best for drier skin), and almond oil (best for oily skin). Not only will this method help your skin regain its natural, dewy glow, but it's also been known to help lessen wrinkles.

OBSERVE CUTLERY CONVENTIONS



- Don't just concentrate on your food. Pay


- attention to what people around you are saying. Take an interest in the conversation.

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THE LEGEND BHARAJA

VISIONARY, MASTER STORYTELLER, TREND SETTER ARE SOME OF THE WORDS THAT DESCRIBE THE LEGENDARY TAMIL DIRECTOR P BHARATHIRAJA. HAILING FROM A VILLAGE IN THENI, TAMIL NADU (THEN MADRAS PRESIDENCY), HE BEGAN HIS FILM CAREER AS AN ASSISTANT TO KANNADA FILMMAKER PUTTANA KANAGAL. BEST KNOWN FOR HIS SENSITIVE STORIES AND REALISTIC CHARACTERS, BHARATHIRAJA MADE HIS DIRECTORIAL DEBUT WITH 16 VAYATHINILE IN 1977, WHICH BECAME A LANDMARK FILM IN THE HISTORY OF TAMIL CINEMA. HE BROKE CONVENTIONAL STORYTELLING METHODS AND CREATED A NEW GENRE, "VILLAGE CINEMA". FONDLY KNOWN FOR THE WORDS 'MY DEAR TAMIL PEOPLE, THIS IS YOUR LOVABLE BHARATHIRAJA!", THIS VISIONARY FILMMAKER AS REDEFINED THE TAMIL MOVIE MAKING. AND THIS LEGENDARY SHARES SOME OF HIS NICEST MOMENTS TO M P SARAYANAN

SINCE MY INNER PASSION WAS ACTING, I DECIDED TO MOVE TO CHENNAI TO PURSUE MY DREAM AS AN ACTOR. BUT DURING THOSE TIMES, FACIAL FEATURES OF ACTORS WERE GIVEN MORE IMPORTANCE AND THOSE WITH SOFT AND FAIR WERE CHOSEN AS HERO

'Life was hard to survive when I came to Chennai, to make a career in Tamil film industry in 1962. I had to do odd jobs to keep my life going. While I was struggling to become a director, Illaiyaraja was also trying hard to pursue a career in music. I already knew him during my village days, as I used to write and act amateur dramas in many village festivals in Dindigul, Pattukottai and he used to compose music for my plays. One day, when I was moving around Pondybazaar (Chennai) to have lunch, I saw the photo cards of movie of Kannada film, 'Belli Moda' (Tamil: Velli Megam, 'Silver Clouds') in erstwhile Rajkumari Theatre. I was highly impressed by the visuals of the film, determined to see the movie. I bought the ticket with the hunger in my stomach.

The plot and story of the movie was realistic and I found that Kannada director Puttanna Kanagal was the man behind the film. The realistic depictions of the characters and stories influence me and I made up my mind to join as assistant director to him. But I had no one to help. At that time, I spoke about my wish to musician GK Venkatesh through Illaiyaraja who was working as guitarist under him. One day, he took me to Puttanna Kanagal and recommended to take me as assistant director. I told Kanagal that his films were great inspiration and wished to join as assistant to learn direction as his style and taste were very different. But he immediately said that film direction cannot be taught and only through observation one can learn the work.

I assured that I will learn through observation and worked as assistant director in his Tamil film 'Irulum Oliyum' which was the remake of his Kannada film 'Kappu Bilupu'. Even though I worked only one film, he was one of the best directors of his time. Being a thorough professional, he understood every emotion of the characters in his film. Moreover, he had ability to grab the emotions from the artists during the shoots. After he moved to Kannada film industry, I continued to work in Tamil

Industry, since I didn't know the language. As an associate director, I worked in 'Thagam' a movie by students from film institute; the entire budget of the movie was around ₹ 1 Lakh. During the movie, I could understand and learn the sound editing, dubbing, effects which were essential for movie making. But still I could not make a movie, since survival was hard, I continue to work as assistant director to Krishnan Nair, Avinashi Mani, A Jagannathan.

Though Bharathiraja was struggling to become a director, he initially want to pursue as an actor in Tamil movie industry. Recalling his early years about his passion for acting, he says, 'during my school days, I showed more interest in drama and performing arts than in studies. Sitting the last bench during my 9th standard, I used to avoid questions from teachers. One day my Tamil teacher, Ramalingam Pillai asked me to read a lesson on Mahabalipuram. I stood and read the notes like uttering the dialogues from famous movies like, 'Parashakti' and 'Manohara' which was routine in many amateur dramas of 1950's and 1960's. He immediately got tensed, 'I asked you to read the lesson not to conduct a drama'. But in the afternoon, he gave me a book to read, which contained dramas written by him for a drama competition among school teachers. I was totally confused by his approach. Then I realised that he was asking me to conduct drama. Though I hesitated in the beginning, later decided to accept and take responsibility.

In the end, our drama was selected the best and I received the award for the best direction, and acting. I got a prize money of '5 from 'Vallal' Vellaisamy Nadar, a philanthropist and industrialist. And this incident became a seed to pursue my dream career in movie industry. After the event, I got several offers to act as hero from many drama troupes. During my tenth standard, I acted in many dramas as hero'.

Recalling his early years in the Kollywood,

he says, 'Since my inner passion was acting,' I decided to move to Chennai to pursue my dream as an actor. But during those times, facial features of actors were given more importance and those with soft and fair were chosen as hero, this made me to quit acting. Though anyone can become an actor now, in those days, there were many criteria to be an actor. And I really didn't like depiction of heroes and heroines in the Tamil cinema, because it demanded every actor or actress to be fair and good looking.

Even a 35 year-old hero will be chosen to act as college student and many heroes will continue to don the role of college student for 10 years. And moreover, people accepted those things. But I couldn't, I felt a cobbler need not be good looking; if such a person is to depicting as a hero of a film, a person with dark complexion should be the lead. At this time, film making drew my attention; moreover, I felt that being a 'director' is more than actor in a film. So I joined as assistant director. But after many years, when Cinematographer Nivas became a producer, he forced me to act. Due to his compulsion I played a character, but I didn't feel essence of the role, so I decided not to act in films in future.

Many years later, when top director Mani Ratnam approached to essay a role, I was initially hesitant. But I played the character in due respect to him. But later I essayed role of sad father in 'Pandiya Nadu' for director Suseenthiran, who convinced me to play the role which I was hesitant because, once I saw actor Vishal in an event, remembering his height I thought, how could I act as a father to tall hero like Vishal'. When the movie was released everyone appreciated my role. Currently I am acting in two films, 'Kurangu Bommai' and another film (yet to titled soon), while former is old man other is an innocent and I felt very satisfied with roles. Because When I saw my performance I couldn't feel believe myself and really feel that actor in within me has not died.



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Throughout my career I directed a variety of films including Hindi (5), Telugu (4) and Tamil (40 plus) and currently I am directing a film titled 'Om' and also playing a role in it. And I feel thoroughly feel satisfied and enjoyed doing the work. Audience will definitely feel the difference after watching the movie. Even though I came to acting in the 1960's, it didn't materialise, but after so many years, God has realised my inner passion and fulfilled it.'

Describing in the selection of Raadhika for his movie 'Kizhakke Pogum Rail' he says, 'It was my second picture. Initially I booked actor Kamal Hassan and Sridevi for the leading artiste. But later actress Madhavi signed for female lead. But she was too busy as her schedule was full and she couldn't move out of Hyderabad. I tried to rope Subhashini, sister of actress Jayasudha through a telephonic conversation which I managed to convince her. But she too was busy. With no choice, I had to leave the entire my shooting unit in Mettupalayam (Tamilnadu) for searching a heroine in Chennai. At this moment, a famous choreographer approached me to bag the role of female lead for her sister. While going through the album I noticed a photo of a girl (Raadhika) wearing lungi and it happened to her neighbour's daughter. I got the address and went to see the girl in Besant Nagar (Chennai). While stepped into the house, we saw a dark girl watering the plants and as we moved closer, she became afraid and ran away. But her mother recognised me as the leading director in Tamil industry and we were invited in her house. While her mother accepted our offer to cast, the girl hesitated. As part of the procedure, I put a half sari to frame a view. But she once again got angry and shouted in Sinhalese and English language to her mother. After all this tedious chores finally I managed

to convince her. The main reasons for selection are her innocent smile and hair, along with body language and dark complexion was like a village girl. Moreover, I was very sure, that my female lead must not look like a typical heroine. When we planned for a rehearsal for song near a temple on Old Mahabalipuram Road (Chennai), she landed in an ambassador car. When I made enquiries about her I was shocked to know, that she is the daughter of legendary Tamil actor MR Radha, which they didn't inform me.

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Apart from convincing my cinematographer and I decided to keep Raadhika away from media publicity in order to avoid negative comments and public disappointment about my choice. But when we landed in Mettupalayam along with Raadhika, my assistant directors Bhagyaraj, Viji were shocked at my selection. During the rehearsal, Raadhika could not act or dance along with song, and she began to cry and was about quit the film. But we once again managed to convince her by buying chocolates and other stuffs, as she was third actress and we were in no mood to make her leave. After a week,

everyone appreciated my choice that she is the perfect one for the female lead. Raadhika never even thought that she will become a heroine and even today she would laugh and ask, 'How did you cast me as an actress?'.


But when it comes to direction, Bharathiraja never thought his first film, '16 Vayathinile' would be trend setter in the Tamil industry. He says, 'I never expected that this film would set a trend in the industry. But when I was making the movie, I was very sure the film will be appreciated by journalists and while I will be getting recognition as top director like those in Malayalam and Bengali film industry, and movie might flop. Moreover, after completing this film I was planning to quit the industry. Surprisingly the film was not only appreciated for its artistic value, it was a commercial success.'

And explaining his zoom close up shot of actor Kamal Hassan in 'Sigappu Rojakkal', he says that the final zoom is the turning point of the movie. 'If I hadn't kept the shot, he would be termed as the villain, since he committed several murders. Even a flash back of the scenes wouldn't be enough. And inside Kamal Hassan's subconscious mind, there is innocence and love for his wife Sharada (Sridevi) and he writes her name, 'Sharada is my wife' in the wall, which tells us that this is the first time he has truly fallen in love. In order to portray the innocence and his love, when Sridevi decides to move away from jail, a final zoom shot is made to show the close-up of Kamal's face to show the tears. If that scene wasn't included he would be considered a criminal. Even during the shoot, I told Kamal Hassan not to blink his eyes and to show tears. And he did that, which defined the climax of the movie'.






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TOP HEROES OF THE INDUSTRY NEVER DIE
IN THE MIND OF THE FANS. IF THEY ARE SUCCESSFUL, EVEN
AT THE AGE OF 75 THEY WOULD FIGHT WITH A SWORD MORE
IMPORTANTLY, MEN ARE MOSTLY PORTRAYED AS ICONS OF
HEROISM, WHEREAS HEROINES ARE CONSIDERED AS SYMBOL
OF BEAUTY WHICH FADES OVER A PERIOD OF TIME

While actors Kamal Hassan gave his complete co-operation in the movie, Bharathiraja says that male actors have the ability to sustain for longer period of time. When questioned about the long standing top heroes in Kollywood like RajiniKanth and Kamal Hassan who continue to act as hero from 1970's to 2016, he says, 'In all kinds of cinema industries throughout the world, male lead are always portrayed as characters steaming with heroism, and the most successful among them will continue to stand for longer period of time. In Tamil industries, MK Thiyagaraja Bhagavathar and PU Chinnappa were the first and next came MGR and Shivaji Ganeshan, later Rajinikanth and KamalHassan. Top heroes of the industry never die in the mind of the fans. If they are successful, even at the age of 75 they would fight with a sword (he laughs). More importantly, men are mostly portrayed as icons of heroism, whereas heroines are considered as symbol of beauty which fades over a period of time.'

Apart from casting top actors like Kamal Hassan and Rajini Kanth, his work with legendary Tamil actor Shivaji Ganeshan in 'Mudhal Mariyadhai' proved to be a fantastic combination. 'Everyone knows that Shivaji Ganeshan's acting style and pronunciation of Tamil words. In 1950's I was greatly inspired by his movies like 'Parashakthi', 'Manohara'. While scripting the movie, I decided to rope in the legendary actor for my male lead and convinced him. When he asked about the story, I said that I could narrate only on the shooting spot and he accepted my word. Usually I started off the movie by shooting the songs before the scenes, because one can bring all sorts of facial reactions in an actor or actress during a song. Moreover, I believe a good artist must provide the lip movement when a song is played. If he

doesn't he will be deemed as unfit to play the role. And it will also be training for him or her. When I was asked the Shivaji Sir to act in the song, his facial expressions were more melodramatic in nature. So I asked him to tone down a little, and make expression through eyes. But his gestures weren't convincing, I postponed the shoot for the next day. Once again, my demands weren't met on the day. After my repeated requests to tone down the expression, Shivaji sir said 'You are asking me not to act?' and I replied, 'Acting is dangerous and according my policy please don't'. He humbly accepted my advice and performed what I said. When the film was completed he said, 'When I have worked with great directors like Madhavan, Bhimsingh, AC Thirulogachander I knew what I did. So I want see the film to know my performance'. When he was watching the film in Manorama theatre, there was a power cut after the second reel. But he didn't create a fuss. When the movie was released, he said, 'I didn't know where you have kept the cameras during the shoot. But after watching this, I couldn't believe, this is a world class film. I don't know whether the movie will be commercial success or not. At your age, your height of thinking is wonderful' and he finally blessed me. He is a great artist and there is nobody to match him even today.'

Describing the sentiments for names starting with 'R', he says, 'After I named Radhika for her debut film, many assistants and friends, appreciated the names beginning with the letter 'R'. So I started off naming debut actors and actress with 'R' as starting letter like Revathi, Radha, Ranjani. Over a period of time, after introducing Suganya, a thought sparked in my mind, 'Who am I to rename the actors or actresses who already have name?' After the spark I quit the decision to name the debut artist'.

And for man who a trendsetter in Tamil industry, there has been no hobbies for him. 'My hobby is only cinema. I don't know anything other than that sometimes I like reading books and listening to music.' But one day he was asked to conduct a workshop on film in US. 'A government agency from United States selected me to conduct a workshop on cinema along with several other artists from various other fields like painting, sculpture, for period of one and half month. Though I initially hesitated, I thought this could be an opportunities to travel to the western nation. When I was struggling to find the airport and planes in New Delhi, fortunately I met a nurse from Usilampatti (Tamilnadu) who helped to locate the plane and accompanied me upto Newyork.

When I landed in Washington airport, an announcement of my name, 'Bharathiraja' in completely different slang in English puzzled me. After the announcement, an official picked and dropped me at a hotel. But I started to sweat when he said that there will be an interview at the embassy. A group of six persons were seated and began bombarded questions and I was once again puzzled with English in American slang. I said, ' I was born and brought up in small village in India and I don't have proficiency in the language. So please talk to me slowly' in a simple English. Embassy official was also shocked as he could understand my English (he laughs).

Finally interview was finished and I heaved a breath of relief. But there was more to come, when I got to know that the workshop was held in New Orleans, a place dominated by people of African origin. In order to avoid more embarrassments I took notes in the English words which I knew for conducting the event. But during the time, they explained about CG works (computer graphics) I just shook my head as though I understood. These academic lessons were more advanced

and much ahead of us. Aiming to save hotel expenses (\$ 120 per day) I stayed in my friend's house and took a train for cut my transportation cost'.

Being veteran director who has transformed the way film making must be done, he feels the film criticism must be accepted social media including facebook. He says, 'Many a times we have to accept those criticisms. In those days, criticism doesn't reach film directors. We could listen to those, only during film festival or 100th day celebration of the movie or public debates. Now the fans have got more opportunity to pose such questions through facebook or youtube. One must realise, when the director has the right to make a film and push his ideas or thoughts in a movie, audience also have the right to question or criticise because it comes under freedom of expression. And if a person teases a story of film and he shares it through a medium, no can express fault in it. Everyone has the right to appreciate or criticise a film. When film critic has right to publish review or criticise a film, why not common man?'

Spelling a word of advice for upcoming directors, 'Nowadays, films in Tamil industry are different in many aspects. But sadly most of them are influenced by foreign films. We can adapt from everything, but while taking the essence we must paint or display with our culture. One can take inspiration but mustn't copy. Moreover I find too much violence in their films which I don't like. In many foreign films one can notice a lot of violence, but the same is repeated here. Youngsters mustn't lose the Tamil culture and traditional values while creating motion pictures. Apart from that, I appreciate the directors who are very well updated and connected to the latest developments happening in the Cinema industry including Suseethiran, Raju Murugan (director of 'Joker'), Karthik Subburaj.' ♦

only makes us proud and happy but also helps us strive harder to keep up the good work. It is like a constant motivation to better ourselves each time we come up with a new collection. We not only try to deliver the best designs but also try to provide unique and better designs every time. We have set a standard for ourselves and we do not want to fall short now.'

And for this Arvind has made JCS different from other wedding jewellery. He says, 'JCS is different from other jewellery store in many ways. First of all, we are not a commercial jewellery store we are a designer jewellery boutique. We use only genuine stones and gold don't compromise on quality. THE REAL GIANT

NO ONE WOULD EVER BELIEVE THAT ONE OF THE MOST SUCCESSFUL BUILDER M ARUN KUMAR OF CASA GRANDE STARTED HIS BUSINESS TO TRY HIS LUCK IN FARMING. BUT MOST OLDEST PROFESSION IN THE WORLD, TAUGHT MORE LESSONS TO THE ENTREPRENEUR, AND HIS VENTURE IN REAL ESTATE BUSINESS PROVED TO BE VERY GOOD SUCCESS. HE ALSO HAS INTERIOR DESIGNING VENTURE CALLED 'DO MY HOME', A FACILITY MANAGEMENT VENTURE NAMED 'CASA GRANDE PROPCARE'. AND ALSO HAVE LAUNDRY CHAIN 'LAUNDRY BOY'. ARUN KUMAR A FIRST GENERATION ENTREPRENEUR SHARE HIS JOURNEY AND VISION, ON HOW HE BECAME ONE OF THE LEADING PROPERTY DEVELOPER TO M P SARAVANAN

'Things never start off with a biggest vision, what started as a hunger to run an enterprise led to this place. When we started the venture, we didn't have fixed numbers in our mind. But we wanted to make Casa Grande, a very successful enterprise in Chennai. As we kept growing we were able to achieve a status as leading developer in the city. Now we want to be pan India player. As I said, we didn't start with big dreams, as we got reasonable success we pushed our limits to achieve more' says Arun Kumar Managing Director of the Casa Grande.

Arun Kumar, a first generation entrepreneur was born and brought up in Chennai. His father T J Manivannan a banker and mother a house wife. He says 'I finished my schooling in Vidya Mandir and completed my B.E (Electronics) in Hindustan College and MBA (Symbosis, Pune). I worked in Wipro for a couple of years. But my inner passion was always to become an entrepreneur.' Arun Kumar plunged in the entrepreneurship by venturing in farming, floriculture (2001-03). Though the ventures got good business, in a matter of time, they didn't fetch good returns or growth. In his words he says, 'Initially we approached farming through commercial venture with different approach through high density planting, high quality fertiliser, irrigation system through which it can be made professional. But farming was more complex to handle and tame. With more failure and less success we decided to pull out from the venture in 2-3 years.' And finally decided to move to real estate business and for the last 12 years, there was no looking back.

But Arun Kumar said earlier, his real estate venture started in a small scale. For the first three years they completed 5-6 projects at a time, and next three years, they began to execute large projects. After six years, they had the ingredients and potential to make it very big. So they build a huge team and took very big land parcels for development. Over a period of time, they became one of the few companies in construction industry to take equity investments. Having achieved a target of '1,000 crore turnover, he is now planning to grow to level of '3,000 crore turnover in 2019.

Explaining his inspiration for becoming an entrepreneur, Arun Kumar says, 'Even though my father is from service sector, my maternal grandfather, Doraisamy Mudaliar founder of Pyorea toothpowder was inspiration for me. Other big inspiration was my friend's father R K Ramanathan founder of American Remedies, a pharmaceutical company. Since both were inspiring 'rag from riches story'. Doraisamy Mudaliar sold toothpowder through door-to-door sales. During the period (1940-50s) such a sale method was very difficult. Later he sold through packets and established a big business ranking next to 'Gopal Palpodi' (Gopal Tooth Powder). The same way, my friend's father R K Ramanathan started his company with just '5,000 as capital and he grew the venture to bigger level and sold the company to the tune of '100 crores to Dr Reddy's Laboratories. Since I have seen him from childhood, I was greatly inspired by his single man effort to grow and achieve big. These two were my role models and


inspiration to become a successful inspiration in my life. And I have alot of respect for Wipro Ltd chairman Azim Premji, who is a great visionary. The way he gets the right people in doing the things rightly is amazing. A leader might not be best person to complete every job. But he must be best person to select the best one to finish the job'

But being a first generation entrepreneur with a lot of passion towards business, Arun Kumar had a rare trait of being fearless. 'I wasn't afraid, didn't have any wealth to protect and hadn't nothing to lose. If we don't have anything what were are going to lose?' he laughs.

As a word of advise he says, 'Rewards come with risks. If you are willing to handle bigger risk or challenges, you will get bigger rewards. This is the way of life. Born in a middle class family of Fathima Bee and Yejaj, a health Inspector, Y Aasife was the eldest son. Due to family's financial crisis, he started working as a newspaper distributor at the age of 11 in his bicycle which his mom bought for Rs 150.

While he was earning an income through selling old newspapers, an idea of selling old answer sheets of school students struck his mind. He immediately went to St. Theresa Girls Higher Secondary school (Pallavaram) to seek permission of the sisters to give him the sheets. The sisters took him to the store room where he saw 50 kgs of answer sheets piled in a room. He immediately went to his mother and asked for money to buy a tricycle. Without hesitation she gave her earning to sell and buy a tricycle and that day he earned Rs 3,000. Later he went to all schools and his business began to flow.

Later, his parents advised him to work in Dubai, so that he can earn more. But a tragedy struck, the agent left him on the roads of Mumbai. With no money, he asked a cobbler to give him work of stitching the shoes, (and pay him Rs 500) so he could return to Chennai. Thankfully cobbler accepted. Though he bought the train ticket, he was left with only Rs 5. And nothing to eat, he had to drink only water for the rest of the journey.

This incident made him feel ashamed and he took a lifetime decision to start a business. He joined Aasmin bhai, a famous chef who runs catering business (for wedding ceremonies). The first few weeks he learned the tricks on how to get good meat, rice, right ingredients for better taste. Finally he took the spatula for cooking his own biriyani receipe.

With his mother's insurance money and knowledge of biriyani recipes in his mind, Aasife opened his first 'thaluvandi shop' (Shopping cart) at T.Nagar beneath the large tree which is now houses famous jewellery shop. Due to problems from antisocial elements, his business suffered and one time his cart was broken. But he never lost hope and setup a shop at Butt Road (near Nandambakkam, Chennai) and then it was never a turning back for him.

For the past 16 years, he made Aasife
Biriyani a food chain all over Chennai
with 15 outlets and his very next outlet is
to be established at Srilanka and Dubai in
the next month. When questioned about
his choice about biriyani, he replied, 'It's
one of my favourite food and during the
battles in Mughal period, biriyani was
considered the energy food for warriors
and soldiers as the rice gives stamina and
meat strengthens bones and different
spices provide various benefits. Also, he
added that many Islamic dishes will be
introduced in Aasife Biriyani next to the
signature dish 'Grill Chicken'.

Apart from business, Aasife also sends biriyani regularly to the NGOs and CS Girls home at Vysarpadi and other areas in Chennai who can't afford the dish. When queried about how his parents feel about his success, with smiles he says 'without my mother, I am nothing what I am right now. She feels very happy about me and she is my best friend ever', he says joyfully. To conclude Aasife is your name but what does it mean, I ask and he says it means 'toofan' i.e 'puyal' (Urdu) and he has spread like wildfire to reach this level.

You're unique USP?

Do not fear and you can't reach greater heights if you're in a perfect comfortable zone.

What is your success formula to reach this level?

I celebrate each and every day with work with interest. The words, 'What' Next', keeps running in mind. I dream big and never settle. I won't compromise for anyone and don't cares what others say. I indulge in any activity if I like it and these are the three formulas.



Having written more than 300 literary pieces including 200 novels, short stories and essays, what do you think the your readers expect from you? Do you think your creative works have satisfied them?

The main reasons behind the problems in our life, is due to not others, but due to us. So I advice them reorganise or rethink to solve the issue. Moreover, I also provide solutions on how to solve it. The reason behind my motive is due to the lessons that I learned in my life. If I had been right everything would have been fine. It is the way we see and perceive things if I am aggressive, opponents would also be the same. There should always be calmness and patience in everything we do. In order to achieve this, one can follow mediation, 'mantra japa' and certain religious practices or other things. So these advices deal with individual's personality and addresses them towards a higher path, they like me very much. My creative works are like conducting a workshop. While reading the piece, it would be like participating in such an event, which sound very easy, but it is not. I am just a stimulus!

Every creative writer plans his work based on his inspiration or heart touching incident, and later gather information. How about your style do you write immediately after an inspiration?

It depends upon the type of the novel 'Udaiyar' novel took around 21 years to write. Story and plot revolves around the Tanjore, I had slight inclination towards the city and having visited for more than 100 times, it initiated thought processes which manifest to write the novel after more than 15 years. But some novels, take only a month to write. Gathering information is not difficult, but I have to move towards it and situation that push me must be considered important!

Can you explain the certain hindu ritual which are mentioned in 'En Kanmani Thamarai', where a woman itself is worshipped as a religious and spiritual being? Such kind of rituals is possible in the current scenario? Why many people refuse accept the core aspect of Hinduism which is mentioned in you works?

Hindu rituals are possible in all scenarios. It all depends on our needs. It is kind of activity (Nyamam). When it comes to permission, nobody needs to accept my work. I write what I feel correct for me and nobody has the right to say it's wrong. I am writing this out of my own experience, not just born out of reading books. I am 71-year-old man having rich knowledge regarding traditions and rituals and I have faced many odd and strange situations in my life. If somebody shouts that our religion is wrong, then which religion is correct? Is my religion is wrong or every religion is wrong. Many people say that Hinduism is alone filled with mistakes. But they never point out mistakes other

religions. When you are saying that a religion is wrong, one must studied and research a lot.

Is the limit for freedom of expression, particularly in writing?

Everything has a limit, when you live in this world, you cannot live without limit or boundaries. When it comes to writing, one cannot write as we wish. They are many dirty places in our society, but one must realise what is our purpose! Writer's experience tells him, what and how to write. One must not write absurd or awkward things and provoke anger. Purpose is to make the reader understand, if you make him angry, how will he understand?

What is the inspiration behind writing novel 'Irumbhu Kuthirai' and usage of 'Alaipayuthe Kanna' song as theme song for explain death in 'Thalaiyani Pookkal'?

I was working as purchase officer in a company, when a truck loaded with spares and tools went missing. Since, there was a possibility of factory production getting delayed I was forced to go in search of the vehicle. After searching desperately in several places, luckily I found the truck. During the course of finding the vehicle I had opportunity to meet many persons and understand the nuances and social-cultural unheard life of transportation. This provoked me to write a novel. In the novel, 'Thalaiyani Pookkal', the song 'Alaupayuthe Kanna' was not written to



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denote death, but a wish to see the divine god or lord. But when I listen to the song I felt it is a like moving or dragging towards death or parting away from the body. It is a kind of interpretation from my point of view.

Can you list out some of your favourite novelists?

Cancer Ward, a semi-autobiographical novel by Russian author Aleksandr Solzhenitsyn. I read many books written by Arthur Koestler, Aldous Huxley, Ayn Rand. I also loved reading Ayn Rand's We the Living, Atlas Shrugged, The Fountainhead. I have read many creative works from Malayalam and Telugu. I also met veteran Kannada writer Shivaram Karanth. He was joyful enough to receive me and was very happy to see my family. After reading novels and other creative works from four southern states, I didn't find much of a difference in the way of life or relationship issue including, how they treat women? how they understand them? Circumstances and situations are quite different.

Is any of your works translated in English?

No. So far nobody has approached me. I terms of religion, caste. Apart from interesting never made any attempt. Let people in our state, literary pieces, I couldn't find any genuine or

read and understand. Apart from that, there is no facilitator or bridging such a setup in our country. If any Tamil writer wants to translate his works to English, he must be financially sound to pay for translator. And after getting translated the work must be taken to publisher, who must treat it with respect. I feel there is no demand among the people to read even Tamil creative works. And I feel, many English readers are not concerned in knowing about the creative works in Tamil language. If they get interest, something might happen!

It is widely said that Tamil language hasn't got its due recognition in India?

That is true. But so far nobody took the effort get the recognition. There is no use in just shouting about not getting the due recognition. It is in the hands of politicians, but they are playing dramas on the issue.

Your opinion on the growth of social media platforms and networks?

Facebook is mostly filled with gossips and many comments are idiotic. Many use the social media platform to attack others in terms of religion, caste. Apart from interesting literary pieces, I couldn't find any genuine or positive criticism. A novel requires at least 600 pages, but some write 5-6 pages in a facebook post to claim it as a masterpiece, thereby positioning themselves as great thinker or idealist or philosopher. They are not ready to perform a hard work of writing 500 pages, which I consider it as sign of laziness. Veteran Tamil critic and writer Ka.Na.Subramanium said those feel lazy to create fictional stories, write poems. I feel those who are lazy enough to write a novel, go to facebook to write something. I consider writing creative works only in facebook posts is the height of laziness.

How about your opinions of other art form like paintings, music, sculpture?

I like the paintings of Artist Adhimoolam. And also like Abhangs, Bhajans of musician and singer OS Arun. I also held deep discussions with sculptor Ganapati Sthapati aiming to know the essence and roots of sculpture. Performing arts like drama never impressed me. I have a general aversion towards the art form. I feel that the art form is not complete and I believe it collapses to the superiority and stature of a novel. Apart from this, architecture also had great influence on me. Brihadeeswarar Temple of Rajaraja Chola inspired me to write a novel!

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
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Hockey Champion V. BHASKARAN

PRIDE OF INDIA

VASUDEVAN BASKARAN WAS THE CAPTAIN WHEN INDIAN TEAM WON THE GOLD IN HOCKEY AT THE 1980 MOSCOW OLYMPICS. NO DOUBT, BASKARAN CHERISHES THE MOMENT AND MADE INDIA PROUD, AS HE WAS AWARDED ARJUNA AWARD IN 1979 AND PADMASRI IN 1981. AFTER THE OLYMPIC GOLD VICTORY, BASKARAN HAD COACHED THE INDIAN NATIONAL TEAM SEVERAL TIMES, THE LAST TIME AT THE 2006 MEN'S HOCKEY WORLD CUP IN MÖNCHENGLADBACH (GERMANY). CURRENTLY HE IS THE CHIEF COACH OF BHOPAL BADSHAHS IN WORLD SERIES HOCKEY LEAGUE HE SHARES UNFORGETTABLE MOMENTS IN HIS LIFE TO M P SARAVANAN

'Frankly, we didn't hope that we will win the gold medal in Moscow Olympics (1980). Earlier we planned to reach semi finals and take the finalist as per the prevailing situation. We planned along the leading teams of the world. There was good competition to win the gold medal, as Spain and Poland were good at the game, Russia was also tough at hockey and was the host' he says. Listing out things behind the great success, Bhaskaran says, 'Firstly it is about the team, most of my team members apart from me never participated in the previous Olympics at Montreal (Canada) and most of them were youngsters in the age group of 21 to 24. Being a leader, hard work of the team members and strategy will alone guarantee success. And they performed very well and didn't over do the tasks assigned to them. Secondly, our government gave more importance to sports related activities and one among them was to sent the Indian hockey team 10 days earlier to the event, which gave us plenty of time to practice in a cold country like Russia. Thirdly, our coach Balakishan Singh was very supportive and advised us to take appropriate steps and assured to guide in case of any help' says Bhaskaran with joy and pride.

But success was tough for Bhaskaran and his team, it was not all easy victory at every opponent they met, India which drew 2-2 with both Poland and Spain in the league phase while won Tanzania 18-0, Cuba 13-0 and met host Russia in the semi-finals, but bet the country 4-2 to enter the final. India had to work hard for the gold as Spain put up a fighting performance. Goals by Surinder

Singh Sodhi (2), Mohd Shahid and M K Kaushik set up a 4-3 win for India.

It was a great moment for India to win the gold after a lapse of 16 years, and youngsters who were a part of the team were the best. And they continue to play another two Olympics.

Recalling competition between India and Spain, Bhaskaran says, 'Spain was a good opponent. Its captain Juan Amat, was an extra-ordinary player. His brothers are good players, where a part of the Spain Hockey team. They never concede a mistake and play a defensive game to not give any opportunity to score a goal. But we had the confidence to win them, since we had already fought with them in the league match 2-2. Luckily we had the opportunity to study the game of Spain and found that we are very poised to win the game. In the final, our team members played an extra-ordinary game despite the fact the Spain captain Juan Amat scoring hat trick in it. It was the first time in Olympic history where a team captain scored a hat trick and the team lost the gold medal'.

Having born in family which encourages sports, Bhaskaran's father Vasudevan was national level athlete and mother Padmavathy was a source of encouragement. Bhaskaran took up hockey, which was very famous sport along with Kabaddi in 1960's. When it comes to success, Bhaskaran credits the methodology that is employed in bringing up children. He advises that, lack of physical activities is the main reason hindering the development of

children. He explains, 'Role of parents in the child development is very important. And role of teachers and school is limited when it comes to development of skills and talent; they must not be blamed for that.'

Listing out the certain observations he had made over the years, Bhaskaran notes that, 'I have seen children and youngsters playing in shopping malls, cinema theatre complexes. Many a times, I found young children running along the lobbies and other places. And reason behind is that children are not given time to run, play in parks, play grounds. Moreover, children are addicted to some many other entertainment medias and devices which restrain their physical activities.'

Between 1928 and 1980, India won 8 Olympic gold medals in hockey. After 1980, India has not won a single hockey gold. At the 2012 London Olympics, India's hockey team finished last in a field of 12. But Baskaran feels there is no dearth of talent in the country and says that more than 20,000 youngsters play hockey at various levels in the country. This, according to him, is very high compared to any other nations.

But blames the federations for lack of interest, 'There is always internal politics in every federation, but long standing power struggle and ego clash between the many association and its office bearers is too hot for the sport. And the game has become its first victim. Lack of plan, organised camps, workshop, game schedule, and most importantly lack of promotion' he says. •

Being born sixth of the seven children, Chandrasekar was different in many ways; he was first doctor in five generations in his family tree in Madurai. Educated in Tamil medium, he always a topper in all classes, but he notes that the orientation activities of the school through extra-curricular activities, social service had a deep influence on him, he says, 'It is not only education that matters, they made think about the global perspective of life. When the school started the intra-club, it gave me an opportunity interact and move with the elite groups. My school even adopted a village, where we sanitised and cleaned all places. Moral Instruction (MI) classes gave a lot of information about culture, heritage, and mythology. I these greatly influenced me in shaping my personality and my career.' In terms of extra-curricular, Chandrasekar was the good at oration, he has won several prizes in Tamil and English; he is very good at 'Tirukkural' and 'Kambaramayanam'. Apart from being a school topper and orator, through this kind of exposure during his life, he was not only able to understand not only sympathy, but also empathy.

In terms of growth and achievement, exposure also gave urge to reach top, he says 'It gave the courage to achieve more. You find this type of attitude in self-motivating people.

Moreover, I was very careful not extinguish the fire in my belly attitude, due to the early success I achievement in my school days'.

Speaking about his decision to choose medicine, 'To be very frank, there were only two kinds of career which were widely known, Medicine and Engineering. I wanted to be medical scientist. During my school days I read a lot of books about achievers. My great inspiration was Alexander Fleming, who discovered Penicillin and Alexander Graham Bell and Thomas A Edison. My hero was Ronald Ross, who found the causative agent for spread of malaria. These reading experiences made me to think like a scientist. Since I was good at studies and due to my father TN Seshadri's encouragement, I took medicine and finished my MBBS course (Madurai Medical College) in 1978, 'he recalls.

But learning new things apart from medicine started in his life, 'When I choose to study in MD (Internal Medicine) in PGIMER (Chandigarh), on the advice of my seniors, I had to learn Hindi and I learned it with help of my friends. It was same like learning English during MBBS course which was new to me, as I studied in Tamil medium. Since I was quick learner, I was soon able to competitive enough to match my peers.'

After completing MD (Internal Medicine) he decided to move forward in Gastroenterology, which is quite unknown. Recalling an incident, which ignited him to move towards that field, 'When I was studying internal medicine, 80 year-old person was admitted for vomiting blood. In normal circumstances, open surgery will be performed to detect the cause, Dr J P Dilavari who had arrived from UK, used endoscopy to find the cause, it was bleeding in the intestine, he immediately administered an injection and it stopped immediately. It was quite surprising for me, and I believed that this is going to be the

future of this kind of method to treatment, thereby avoiding a major surgery. Moreover, department of gastroenterology headed by SK Mehta was very good, with some of the best surgeons in the country. Many of the toppers and my seniors, who came here to study from various states, also took gastroenterology. Since there were many top cardiologists, I don't want to be one among them. Moreover they were many innovations were following in that area, which made me pursue the path, which made me to join the course'.

After spending more than 5 years studying internal medicine and gastroenterology, he moved to Chennai to Assistant professor in Madras Medical College and it should be noted that he was youngest to complete MBBS, MD and DM at a stretch (before 29). Being a bachelor, he had to spend more time to teach students and motivate many students to take up gastroenterology and even move to PGIMER (Chandigarh). After period 2 years 3 months he was posted to Coimbatore Medical College & Hospital to start a new department for gastroenterology (1989) and continued to serve as chief Gastroenterology, which was very challenging for a young doctor to take up a position. But, Chandrasekar decided to move to private practice, he says, 'with the speed in which gastroenterology was growing, I couldn't cope up in government setup. In many a times, to get a helping hand or procuring a equipment was difficult. Since my wife knew that I am strong personality and I felt that I took a right decision'. His full-time decision led to the birth of MedIndia Institute of Medical specialities, which proved to more challenging, he says,' Need to have



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comprehensive skills apart from medicine and surgery. One needs to be master in many talents and you need to be jack of all trade particularly in India' he laughs. Being quick learner he was able to win the administrative and financial challenge very quickly. He was also interested in running conferences on gastroenterology on national and international.

On the importance of referrals, he says, 'My way of informing the public is through awareness and educating. Advertisement is also very important and useful for patients. I usually get many complicated cases'.

In 2001, he had sparked that why not start one more hospital in Chennai, 'I felt Coimbatore is small for me. Since I had imported medical devices, I had to test and make it useful for many more patients. But many friends warned that since there are already well-established players in the city, it will be very difficult for me. For over a period of three months, after a visiting more than 100 sites, I zeroed for this

place (Nungambakkam). Now I am successful in Chennai' he says.

Now after 15 years, Dr TS Chandrasekar is a leading gastroenterologist in India and chairman of MedIndia Hospital. Speaking about his personal life, 'My father TN Seshadri gave me full freedom to study, even though he was under financial burden. Till he died in 1994 he never asked any money from me. My mother Radha Rukmini was good at native and traditional knowledge. My wife Sharmila is an under-graduate who helps in hospital management and family. In 2001-04, when I was my travelling from six a days of week from Coimbatore to Chennai, which was quite hectic, she was very support. My son Vivek Sandeep who is a school topper and state topper, completed MBBS and he is currently pursuing PG (Internal Medicine) in New York (US). My daughter Rashmica is a computer engineering professional, who is planning to pursue full-time Bharathnatyam dancer'.

WHEN YOU HEAR THE WORD 'STORY', THE FIRST THING THAT COMES TO YOUR MIND IS YOUR GRANDMOTHER NARRATING ALL INTERESTING AND LIVELY STORIES DURING YOUR CHILDHOOD BUT ERIC MILLER, PH.D (FOLKLORE) HAS CHANGED THIS THEME AND HAS RENAISSANCE THE CONCEPT OF STORYTELLING IN CHENNAI. A SCHOLAR, STORYTELLING TRAINER (COLLECTING ALL THE STORIES AND ITS METHODS, AND RECYCLING IT, TO MAKE IT MORE ACCESSIBLE TO THE PEOPLE LIVING AT THIS CONTEMPORARY ERA) TO MORE THAN 350 STUDENTS AND TEACHERS AND GUEST LECTURER AT FAMOUS INSTITUTIONS SUCH AS IIT, DR.ERIC MILLER, DIRECTOR OF STORYTELLINGINSITITUTE.ORG, NEWYORK CITIZEN TRANSPLANTED TO 'NAMA' CHENNAI, TALKS ABOUT HIS BLOSSOMING JOURNEY WITH AMRITHA PREM AT HIS SPACIOUS, RESIDENTIAL AND WORKPLACE PILED WITH THREE ARRAYS OF BOOKS, NUNGAMBAKKAM

'I came to Chennai in 1988 while pursuing my Masters Degree, especially studying 'Silappathikaram' but I came back to Chennai in 2012 for a field work with the tribal people of Nagercoil about folklore stories (Study of 'grandma stories' and how they narrate but couldn't understand the dialect. So I changed my topic to 'Children songs and games' like 'Oru kudam thani oothi orey poo puthuchan' (One pot of water for one flower.) While observing and studying these songs I recognised four factors, Body acquisition i.e. movements, reputation of words with variation, physical reinforcement and Q & A method, which make the children pick up any language quickly without any difficulties. Also, my mentor Laura Sims, a storyteller and leader of storytelling revival, taught us the art of Storytelling. I really want to train others of what I do, so they can train them this art to somebody and it passes. So, I decided to come back to India in 2005 and establish my own StorytellingInstitute.org at Nungambakkam, he says.

What made you settle in India?

I love India and wanted to be here, also the literary aspect of Tamil culture interested me. The women who put 'rangoli' on the ground are a kind of spirituality which aligns them with the universe, but the people are unaware of it. India is the only place which follows folk, traditional and modern culture with rituals and spirituality which is found nowhere else.

Tell us about storytelling?

Storytelling is a form of public speaking involving various arts such as acting,

talking, dancing, painting, etc. The stories can be from our own life, imaginary or folklore, but each story contains a moral value and situation. The listeners empathise and identify with the characters one after the other with the help of direct speech (acting as a narrator and a listener) which acts as the kick starter to involve emotions in people, so he or she can think, how similar or different it's to their day-to-day happenings and learns how to deal with it.

Storytelling makes people emotionally strong and when emotions get involved, it aligns with the psyche automatically. Storytelling in other words can be expressed as personification. For example, consider chemical elements given life and they interact with you or when the story of inventors or scientists along their struggles is narrated and brought to live with your creative visualization, wouldn't you remember it forever?

What inspires and motivate your creativity?


Every person wants to become him/herself fulfilling or realising his/her absolute potential. This point inspires me in and out. We become more self-aware when we realise our true potential and give back something in return. Love for communication, love for people, love for society and the ability to reach out to people emotionally and intellectually in a crowd. My mentor always emphasis on the social situations such as body language, rhythms, at what day, time and year the story is interacted etc.

Having got over 10 years of storytelling experience to children's, teenagers and



adults, Whom you love training?

I feel really happy and content as many of my students have established their own storytelling organisations. I am also developing storytelling therapy as healing methods for people with Attention Deficit disorder, Autism and Dyslexia. I love training teenagers and adults. Long ago, people pursued what their ancestors did and now adults choose what they like and pursue it without realising what they actually want. They are independent, but doubtful and anxious on the other hand. They make their life complex and suffer which has to be overcome, I will say, else it may lead to a disaster causing stress. •



Educationalist GANESH SUBRAMANIAM

AN EPITOME ON THE PILLAR

AN ELOQUENT SPEAKER AND A VORACIOUS READER, A WRITER, AN INSPIRING MENTOR, AN EDUCATIONALIST, TAMIL LINGUIST, ANTIQUE LOVER CONFINED WITH SIMPLE PRINCIPLES ARE THE RIGHT WORDS TO DESCRIBE HIM. GANESH SUBRAMANIAM (DIRECTOR OF GANESH'S IAS ACADEMY) OPENS UP WITH AMRITHA PREM ABOUT HIS LIFE TURNING JOURNEY WHICH EDUCATES THE STUDENTS AND YOUTHS AT THIS CONTEMPORARY ERA

Born in Tirunelveli to Somasundaram, arts and craft school teacher and Parvathakumari, Tamil teacher, as the youngest son, Ganesh Subramaniam, was a naughty student during school days but excelled in 10th and 12th examination scoring the first mark in his school. His interest in Tamil was mainly due to his maternal grandfather Shanmugha Sundaram, Editor at 'Virakesari Pathrikai' who writes articles with his pen name Maradnus (Sundaram in reverse order). Being in an educated family and surrounded by school teachers, everyone thought he might end up becoming a teacher or lecturer but he had other dreams, he wanted to become a doctor in the army but fate had other plans for him.

'After completion of my schooling, I got a call from Mazogon Dock with a 5-year contract bond along the sponsorship for my education, but due to lack of awarness I missed the golden opportunity. Later I enrolled myself in B.Sc (Physics) at Manomaniam College of Arts & Science. During my first semester, my score was 42% and I realised I need to improve and cope up' he recalls.

With inspiration from his friend's father M
Palani, an IFS officer he started preparing
for civil service examination. But turning
point in his life came when met N Sridharan,
Diplomat in Taiwan (General affairs), 'He
comes often to teach 'Governance' at Periyar

Thidal, where I was studying for my civil examination. He also guided and moulded students in pursuing civil service. But after two attempts, I got upset and went to meet Vaidehi his wife who was working at Ananda Vikatan, and told her that I am going to look out for a job and she convinced me to discuss with Sridharan who was in Delhi. Listening to her words, I waited for him, when he arrived, he promised my parents to take care of me and took me to Delhi. His words, his teachings on how to approach life and its value made me a better person and it completely changed my perspective about life.'

'All my students tell I am a good teacher and a mentor and all these credits will go to Dr Devi Ranjendran, a fine personality, because of whom I am a good teacher right now', he says proudly.


'Rajendran, a Tamil lecturer never takes students if they haven't cleared prelims and I went to his class against this and left his classes when I couldn't clear my prelims in my first two attempts. With the recommendation of Sridharan, I got myself enrolled and cleared my mains at 1999 and I couldn't clear my interview so I took a break. Sridharan often tells me to guide people in whichever field we pursue, so I thought of teaching and joined as a teaching staff at Periyar Thidal. And when I gave my final attempt at 2000.


I cleared the prelims and mains, but got dejected in the interview at 2001. But, I met my life long inspiration from my student turned better half, Miss Monika, whom I fell in love and got married in 2002. My failure made me to establish Ganesh's IAS Academy at Whitehouse, Annanagar (at present) at July-August, 2001 with two students and my wife by my side, he smiles.

Describing his struggle he says, explaining the concept itself was a big struggle for me. Many said it will become a failure and it may end up becoming like a tutorial centre but my hopes didn't. When I asked Shanthakumar, Director of Gurunanak Law School, Delhi, to take classes for my institution, he agreed, saying we must start doing instead of waiting it to happen and Stephen, Life science professor at Nandanam college of Arts and Science too agreed. After 2 years we started giving good results, I started another branch at Chrompet in 2011, he says happily.

And Ganesh believes not advertise his institute, 'Education is not to be sold and while preparing for competitive exams the success is uncommon and failure is common, so I never want to build hopes and the risk factor is too high'.

He also has great hopes for the future, he says 'I wanted to setup an hub at Tamilnadu for UPSC aspirants and now I will say I want to become an author and a mentor'. ◆

Top lens man Karthik Srinivasan's journey was tough one, this celebrated fashion photographer began his career an assistant cameraman, modelled for a while and now owns a production company called Dream Cast, KAPA (photography academy). But early life of the young boy from Kambam (Theni District) was riddled with thorns.

'In my younger days, like many other boys
I loved playing cricket and ball badminton.
But my interest towards photography
grew after seeing photos and pictures from
magazines like Kumbam, Kalki, Ananda
Vikatan 'he says. And luckily Karthik had
opportunity to get a camera from his second
brother-in-law Dr Vijay Ganesh, whom
taught the basics of photography and to shoot
the rural settings of Theni and Madurai.

Over a period of the Karthik interest towards photography grew more and more and he decided to pursue a career in cinematography, while studying B.Sc (chemistry) in SN College, Madurai. Since his elder brother-in-law Babu, was close friend of leading cinema legends like RV Udhayakumar, Aravind Raj. AR Ramesh. With the help of the legends, he tried his lucky to get a seat in D.F.Tech in Film institute (Taramani, Chennai). Unfortunately he ran out of luck and was back in Madurai to continue his graduation.

After completing his degree, Karthik's family Eldams Road (Chennai).

members were quite were worried about his career. But the problem was solved when his elder brother-in-law Babu assured Karthik's father Srinivasan to move to Chennai to stay in his elder sister Vasanthi's house. And Karthik started working in his DTP office. Later he decided to move to pharmaceutical industry as medical representative to work in Ahmedabad (Gujarat). While working as representative he also decided to pursue a career in modelling. And it was rewarding indeed, as he walked ramps along with Milind Soman, Sonu Sood and John Abraham, he also participated in various modelling contests. Apart from money he got from assignments and shoots, it gave good knowledge about modelling world and fashion, as he travelled to countries like Thailand, Taiwan etc.

'Even though when I was a model, photography was very close to my heart, which I could never forget. During assignments I used to take more interest in the light, shadow, shades and study the positions of the light setting' he says. As the inner passion grew larger and larger, one day he decided to quit the pharmaceutical industry to pursue photography. Though decision was a risk, he got the support of his two sisters and brother-in-laws. Back in Chennai, with saving and loans he started photo studio named 'Hungry Tiger photography' with his savings and loan at Eldams Road (Chennai).

Without a strong network, Karthik faced a huge trouble in getting assignments in Chennai. But he was not fed up; he moved to Bangkok get assignments. Luckily he got works from Advertising agencies and he shifted to Bangalore, which proved more successful.

Having learned and tasted the success, Karthik once again moved to Chennai. And this time, his works and projects were accepted among the modelling and advertising industry. In order to gain a special place in fashion photography at Chennai, Karthik took a different approach towards photography. Explaining his perspective, 'In 2005-06, there is an odd trend prevailing in the industry. If a leading photographer follows a particular method or style, most of the photographers would follow it as a trend. So I planned to create my own style, I listed out the styles and methods of the leading photographers and did whatever that is opposite. Though it was initially not appreciated, people began to accept it as innovative one '

Having journeyed a long way from model to a leading photographer, Karthik was won several awards from various foundations and magazines. Though he is happy about the way he has arrived and captured the fashion photography industry to be a leading man within a short period of time, he has not forgotten the struggle he has undergone over the years.



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Cartoonist KESHAV THE LINE KING

POLITICAL CARTOONING IS A VERY SERIOUS BUSINESS AND A FANTASTIC FORM, WHICH YOU FIND A REASON TO READ THE MESSAGE AND TO LAUGH AND LAUGH OUT. KESHAV BELONGS TO THAT BREED WHOSE CARTOONS EVOKE BOTH MESSAGE AND HUMOUR. A SOFT-SPOKEN GENTLEMAN, WHO MOVED FROM HYDERABAD TO CHENNAI, HAS JOURNEYED 28 YEARS FROM A NATIONAL NEWSPAPER 'THE HINDU' HAS A LOT TO SHARE AND IS PERFECT FOR AN IDEAL

'I born and brought-up in Hyderabad. Even though we didn't learn Tamil script, the language was our mother tongue. Being in the Andhra city I learnt Hindi, Telugu and Sanskrit – andover a period of time, I also learned Tamil. Ever since I was child, drawing was my passion, but my mother is used to say that even before learning the alphabet, I knew how to draw And it was my first language, if you question my mother tongue, I would say it isdrawing' he laughs

Born in an orthodox family, his father Pitchumani was working in RBI, mother Sita, a housewife, where atmosphere was more spiritual rather than artistic one, drawing was always there with him throughout his life including school and college not a day was spend without drawing. After schooling, he did his graduation in correspondence which gave him ample time to learn from classical art masters, ' I go to British Council Library and American Embassy (Council) to learn and sketch from reference book and paintings of Leonardo, Michelangelo, Rembrandt, Van Gogh which had good influence on me. Apart from that, Indian painter Ravi Varma was my inspiration. In 1970s during a family visit to Jayachamarajendra art gallery in Mysuru, I could see original paintings of the great Indian master. Size of the original paintings was very inspiring for me, which triggered my passion towards drawing, though I never told anybody about that' he recalls.

An experimental artist who learned drawing and painting through trial and error, Keshav's father was quite hesitant to allow his son pursue an art career, when his drawing master suggested to put him in JJ School of art (Mumbai) owing financial status of the family, the dream was not fulfilled. And this was also reason why he had to pursue graduation

through correspondence instead of college. When he send his sketches and other illustrations to AnandaVikatan. There the veteran cartoonist Sridhar, appreciated his lines and asked him to sketch the music concerts including musicians, celebrities and other members of the public, which started his career in drawing and cartoon. Apart from this, he used to sketch political leaders during live television broadcast, which was published in 'AnandaVikatan' in 1982-87. Through Vikatan he learnt from the great cartoonists like Mali, Raju, Gopulu, Silpi, Sridhar and Madhan. This was the beginning of his cartooning career.

But the turning point in Keshav's career came in 1987, when he joined 'The Hindu' as a full-time cartoonist to leave his job in a nationalised bank. Yet again, his family members were hesitant, since it was a government job. Keshav was strong in his decision. Again it was Sridhar (AnandaVikatan)who convinced my family that the job is secure one and there wasnothing to worry. This started his life-long career in cartooning.

When it comes cartooning, Keshav was not interested in politics, the cartoonist job once again gave him a platform to learn and strengthen the art of cartoon. He says, 'You have to see and observe cartoons around the world. I went back to British Council to learn about the master cartoonists like David Low, Ronald Searle, Pat Oliphant and others from the cartooning world including our own Laxman, Abu Abraham, Vijayan, Puri etc.,'

While he was running his life as a cartoonist in 'The Hindu', he was also pursuing painting to suits his inner creative aspiration, which gave him unbound freedom. 'In journalism, there is a circle beyond which you cannot grow and

move, editors set the conditions for illustration or cartoon. But here, I set the condition, which doesn't mean I draw whatever I want' he says. Moreover, it took a decade for me to adapt for me, since I had to adjust myself while shifting from one medium to other. In terms of attitude, I had to adjust in artistic aspect, since cartooning is a negative art, in which you have tocriticise and satire. And art which I choose to paint is positive' he reasons.

Explaining reasons for adding colours in recent cartoons, Keshav says, 'I don't like colours in Cartoon, but the trends of the time necessitatedit. In my opinion cartoon must be in black and white. What is a cartoon? It is a rough drawing, where an idea in our mindis spontaneously noted down in the form of lines.'

Acknowledging the changing technologies in visual storytelling and drawing, he says, 'We have to adapt to changes to learn new things. Even though I do colouring using digital techniques, my line drawings are through hand and in paper. But I find my drawing using pen/brush on paper, much faster.'

With change in mediatrends and speed of news reporting, Keshav chooses idea or topic for cartoon for a day based on the issue. He says, 'There is something called 'news for the day'. As cartoonist one mustn't move according to what we know, I understand that I am working for a national daily and I must look at a National or South Asian perspective. You can choose a regional topic only when it comes to national level of importance. Sometimes, there may be many news items, but one must choose according the issues. For example, surgical strikes against Pakistan, SC orders to stopping funds from BCCI. When it comes an issue we are not against any party or anybody. It is all based on the issues.' •

UPCOMING STAR

LEON JAMES IS A UPCOMING MUSIC COMPOSER WHO WANT TO MAKE BIG IN KOLLYWOOD. GROWING UP WITH MUSIC COMPOSER ANIRUDH, KISHORE, VIVEK IN A BAND NAMED 'ZINX' FOR SIX YEARS, LEON JAMES HAS ALL THE INGREDIENTS TO MAKE HIMSELF A BIG STAR IN THE MUSIC INDUSTRY. HAVING COMPOSED MUSIC FOR MOVIES FOR THE FILMS, LIKE KANCHANA 2, KO 2 AND UPCOMING FILMS KAVALAI VENDAM, LEON SPEAKS ABOUT HIS JOURNEY

'Keyboard became my fascination and I started playing it at the age of 4, and slowly it became my passion and by 10 I knew this is what I want. ' he says. And his earlier days with Band 'Zinx' played a very crucial role in his life. 'Anirudh, Kishore, Vivek and I grew up together for 6 years with this band. We formed it to perform at school cultural, and once there was a talent hunt called 'Ooh la lala'. We won the competition and Anirudh and I bagged awards for best keyboardist. ' Later he was part of other bands like 'basin bridge' which played jazz rock and pop, 'Pyjamaconsipiracy' which he played electro rock and dub step, 'Eflat' which played psychedelic music. He says, 'It was a unique idea when Aalap Raju thought of a band called 'Project Yuj', where we wanted to represent carnatic in a new format. Our main aim was to bring out the beauty of carnatic music because not many listen to it now days'.

And he always feels and believes in himself and passionate about what he does, 'Vaaya en veera' was composed at home, and I thought its time people know I'm a composer, so I did a video and posted on YouTube after 3 months. Raghava Lawrence saw the video and wanted to feature it in his film.' And whenever he is on stage, he feels relaxed and loves performing. He says, 'Composing music at my studio is a lonely process, but when I'm on stage we interact with the musicians. The crowd keeps cheering, the energy, it is a different kind of high for me. The crowd always motivates me. I go into a trance.' Being a music composer, he feels that auto tune is a ban for professionally trained singers who want to enter the music industry. He says 'I didn't use auto tune for any of my tracks. It is important to keep the music alive. Manipulating with software will make us

lose the soul of the music. With the growth of technology anyone can become a musician now. For those who are passionate software like these are good. But, con wise it restricts entry of new talents.'

When it comes to inspiration for songs, he plays piano for longer period of time and with feel of the musical mood, tunes for comes up in his mind. 'I keep playing tunes, and suddenly, something strikes you and that's where you get it. I also listen to a lot of world music so that inspires me as well. There are a lot of different factors '. A part from pianos, he also plays keyboard, guitar. He is more of a tech freak also likes drum machines and synthesizers as well.

And the sudden celebrity status didn't change his way of life. He says, 'It was a slow process. I don't feel like a celebrity. I've got my house right below my studio, so I've always got time for my family. It's the usual for me. I like all the love I get in my social networks but it is also scary because I have to live up to the bar I have set myself in their hearts.' But was quite scared while working with biggie of the industry, he says, 'Being a new comer, I was scared, and I wanted more of 'Will' I get what I want, because I have something in mind and they might have something. But, they were all the sweetest people. We had good vibes, so it wasn't intimidating after that. '

And he jumped in joy when his album on top of the music charter list. 'I feel good, very happy, and very thankful. It is my first debut album and the support I got from 'Sony music' was motivating. I've done two songs in 'Kanchana 2' but this is my first full length album. So the support makes me feel jubilant'.

Leon spells a word of advice and advice for youngsters, 'Keep going at your passion. Keep following your dreams. Just chase them and work hard. It's important to work hard and build your foundation. 

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Carrom Champion MARIA IRUDAYAM

THE FORGOTTEN MASTER

ANTHONY MARIA IRUDAYAM, IS A TWO WORLD CHAMPION, NINE-TIME NATIONAL CHAMPION IN CARROM, BUT HE IS ALWAYS CALM AND COMPOSED MAN. HAVING WON ARJUNA AWARD MAKES HIM EVEN MORE SPECIAL, SINCE HE IS THE ONLY AWARDEE FOR HIS SPORT - CARROM, HE NEVER OR HAD ANY EGO IN LIFETIME. BUT HE FEELS THAT CARROM HASN'T GOT HIS DUE RESPECT AND RECOGNITION, EXPECTS BOTH STATE AND CENTRAL GOVERNMENT SHOULD DO MORE FOR SPORTMEN. IN A FREEWHEELING CHAT TO M P SARAVANAN HE EXPLAINS HIS CARROM JOURNEY

'Many people say that Carrom has fallen behind other sports despite producing World Champions. But that is not true. Game has never lost its spirit and we could see many youngsters continue play in many places not only in Chennai, but also throughout Southern India. Many carrom players have got seat in Engineering through sports quota' he says with pride.

Explaining how he has got recognised in an event, Maria describes, 'There is good awareness regarding the game and its players. For example, few weeks ago when I was attending a wedding, few people asked me to stand near them to get me photograph along with them. I was taken aback as such a thing never happened in my entire life. But I realised that people are aware of carrom and a champion. Such things make me very happy. '

But he feels the one thing that the game is missing; name, fame, money. As these things greatly influence anyone, many parents prefer their child send their son or daughter to either cricket or tennis. He says, 'Carrom is already popular. There are many places in north Chennai one can find carom centre and street corner playing the game. But the game is not given its due importance in Newspapers and Television media. Every time, there is district level or state level tournament we ask media personnel to cover the event. But most of the time, apart from few reporters many avoid. Some of them, see it as game miniature one! They broadcast even Cricket tournaments played between two government department, and not Carrom national tournament. Not only Carrom, many games are not given its due importance. If any carrom game is regularly telecasted or reported in the media, there are more possibilities that game could grab the attention of sponsors. Then it will eventually

change course of the game in the public. Apart from very few, most of them are not interested'.

When queried about the cost to organise a carrom tournament. He explains it is very economical when compared to other games, Listing out cost factors he says,' For organizing a district level tournament, it cost around ₹1.5 to 2 lakhs. Since there is no boarding or lodging expense involved and main cost revolves around buying wooden boards, coins and lighting facilities. State level tournament would cost around ₹6-7 lakhs and National-level tournament is expensive one. Since players from all the states arrive at one location. We have to arrange boarding and lodging facilities, apart from expenditure related in organising, entire budget would shoot out upto ₹25-30 lakhs. This money is entirely funded by the state or district federation and associations. So when it comes to awarding the prize to district and state level champion, prize money given in few thousands. If sponsorship is available, champions could be given few lakhs! It would be nice to see champions getting bigger money'


Having retired from AirIndia from June 2014, Mariya spends more time in Carrom. He says, 'Even throughout my career, I used spend half of my day at office work. Every afternoon I return home to practice carrom. Since this has been my routine throughout the life, so this retirement hasn't changed my life much. Currently I am holding the designation of secretary of Chennai District Carrom players association.'


Being an office bearer holding an important designation Mariya has big plans to rejuvenate the game to a new level. During those periods, when the Tamilnadu teams goes to national tournament it will eventually bag the

championship in all categories. But over the years, it has changed. He says, 'Though we hold championship in junior and sub junior, we thoroughly lost in senior category to Northern and western states of India. So I am planning to break northern Indian barrier by effectively training the junior and sub-junior players'

Describing practice routine and Maria says that discipline is a key to success. He list out that, apart from hard work, any good carrom players must follow discipline in their practice. Carrom is both mental and physical game. If the hand shivers, the game will lost. Adequate rest and physical fitness is always important. 'I sleep at 10 pm and rise up at 4.30 am in morning. From 4.30 to 6.30 I used to practice a lot of techniques and I also advice young players to rise up early and practice them. Since, early morning there will be an eternal calmness and our mind works very clearly. I also follow some personal discipline. I never used be awake all through the night or get drunk or watch cinema. Apart from this, I never used to take non-vegetarian food during tournament. As I have said, if there is stomach upset one can't even touch the piece' (he laughs).

Being a World champion twice and National Champion 7 times, Maria never forgets his toughest opponent 'Subash Kable'. Recalling the event, 'In 1982, When I reached my first National Championship final, I was shocked to find 5-time National Champion Subash Kable on the other side. I was just 26 and he was around 44. Subash was an extraordinary player, who pockets any piece at any time. He was matchless player and meeting such master champion at a final made my hands shiver. But due to God's grace I won game. Though I beat the champion, I will never forget him and his game! ♦





Entrepreneur ISAK NAZAR EAT HEALTHY, THINK BETTER

ISAK NAZAR IS AN INSPIRING PERSONALITY FOR ALL KINDS OF PEOPLE. WHAT SETS HIM APART FROM OTHER BUSINESS MEN IS HIS ABILITY TO WORKHARD AND ART OF BELIEVING. BORN TO MIDDLE-CLASS FAMILY IN TIRUNELVELI, HE PLAYED SEVERAL ROLES LIKE PHARMA REPRESENTATIVE, MARKETING MANAGER, MARKETING HEAD, GENERAL MANAGER AND FINALLY ROSE UP TO BECOME AN INDUSTRIALIST. ISAK NAZAR OPENS UP HIS LIFE, TO MP SARAYANAN

Being a first generation entrepreneur I.S.A.K Nazar was always hopefully that his business would reach great heights. Founder of Southern Health Foods, makers of Manna brand of health food products, I.S.A.K Nazar says,'I was very sure that food and processed food industry will have a bright future, but it will take some time to yield result. We believed that people will turn back to traditional foods. And it happened, after a period of time, as the society was changing its lifestyle and food habits. Because there was a time, where people, used to eat the raw food and shifted to cleaning and cooking their meals.' Expressing confident about the latest trends, he says, 'And this is the time we are waiting for and now we are aggressively making the best out of the current scenario'

Starting his career as a medical representative in a pharmaceutical industry for a monthly salary in 1984, Nazar led a typical middleclass life in his early years. But interestingly, he always had the passion to start business and believed that he could succeed in it since he was successful in career. 'I started my career in Coimbatore, and moved towards Kerala. Later he shifted back to Tamilnadu in 1990, since my father passed away. So, I could solve the family issues' he says. But, he later moved to an engineering company as Marketing Manager, 'Though my designation was Marketing, I was handling manufacturing, production and other areas. That is the place I actually learnt the core business. Over a period of time, I rose to become as a General Manager'. Experience he got from the company, completely change the Nazar and it personally convinced him to be an entrepreneur.

And now Nazar dreamed of starting a pharmaceutical company, because of his

experience in the industry, which involved participating in medical conference, exhibitions and knowing the nuances of the trade. And fortunately he had the opportunity to work with big Masters from the pharma industry, where he learned different types of marketing techniques. It must be noted that though he was working in lower part of the management, he could move along with big names in the pharmaceutical industry who encouraged him to start a company. Moreover, Nazar's friends and relatives were always encouraging since he is known for passion, determination and hard work. But the situation and circumstances were different, and Nazar decision to plunge in food industry was successful.

It all started when his friend's wife a food technocrat, convinced him to move to food industry. In his own words, 'Being food researcher, she encouraged me to built a company based on Brand. The idea was nice and I went to CSIR- Central Food Technological Research Institute), Mysuru to learn about the industry. Scientists and researchers advised that new grains like Ragi, Oats will command a good respect. After wide discussions and consultations, I decided to start a manufacturing business'.

There were initial fears, since Nazar was earning good salary and leading happy life with a good paying job. But he took the risk to start the Manna Foods with the support of his wife and family. Manna Health mix which was first product from the stable was successful. But Nazar had to suffer financial difficulties including mobilizing funds so he put his own savings. 'In the current scenario, ideas are respected and getting financial support is easy. But in those days is was very difficult'

But every business has its share of ups and downs, Nazar also faced those ones, 'In the first three years, our products were successful and we decided to expand our business. As a part of the growth strategy, we ventured into masala divisions in terms of volume sales in 2003 and launched the products in all four states. Due to presence of big players, the situation turned bad and within two years, we realised that we had taken a wrong step. Then we took the life-time decision to withdraw the whole division. It took at least 4 years to recoup and come back' he recalls.

Explaining about his family, 'Both my parents were teachers; I have 5 siblings including three sisters and two brothers. My last brother Syed Sajan who was working in Dubai, came back to help me in my business and he is co-promoter of the company.'

When queried about the more start-ups in technology than in manufacturing, Nazar says that technology era is getting over, and manufacturing is permanent. And technology that is useful to manufacturing will withstand for a longer period of time and those for service will last for a shorter term. One must remember, manufacturing is a core business of the country,'

Spelling a word of advice for young entrepreneurs, Nazar says, 'First and foremost, they mustn't afraid. They must plunge into business after doing proper homework. Secondly, they should have confident and matured enough to face anything, because the industry might look transparent, it is not easy to succeed. Thirdly, everyday they will be facing problems and must be willing to take it as a part of the life. •



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Social activist PORAJ CARRYING A LEGACY

HIS RESUME READS LIKE THE IDYLLIC DREAM, ADA SCIENTIST, SCIENTIFIC OFFICER, WRITER AND CONVENER OF ABDULKALAM VISION INDIA MOVEMENT. V PONRAJ IS A MAN WITH A VISION, HAVING WORKED ALONG CLOSELY WITH LATE PRESIDENT DR APJ KALAM FOR MORE THAN 20 YEARS. HE HAS TRAVELLED ALONG WITH PRESIDENT AROUND 20 COUNTRIES, ATTENDING MORE 2,500 LECTURES AND HE HAS BEEN SENT AS A REPRESENTATIVE TO 25 COUNTRIES ON BEHALF OF THE LATE PRESIDENT APJ ABOUL KALAM. HAVING COLLABORATED WITH HIM IN PREPARING SEVERAL SPEECHES, LECTURES AND BOOKS, HE IS ALSO CURRENTLY MENTORING A POLITICAL PARTY BEARING DR APJ ABDUL KALAM. BY M P SARAVANAN

'I was born and brought-up in Thonugal village at Virudhunagar district in 1966. My father Vellaichamy was a police officer and mother Subbulakshmi a housewife. I got my secondary education from S Subbaih Nadar School (Virudhunagar) and completed by graduation in VHNSN College (B.Sc-Mathematics) and Masters degree from Bharathidasan University (M.Sc Applied Mathematics). After working in a company at Coimbatore, I joined Indian Institute of Science (Bangalore) as Junior scientific assistant, later I moved to Madurai Kamaraj University as Junior information scientist. In 1995 I successfully completed my entrance exam to join Aeronautical Development Agency (DRDO) which works on the designing and development Light Combat Aircraft, and at that time I met Dr APJ Abdul Kalam' says Ponraj listing out his brief journey.

Explaining his inspiration to become a scientist, Ponraj says, 'Ever since my childhood days, I am a follower of Tamil stalwart MGR (MG Ramachandran), I was inspired by songs and themes from his movies. When I was studying 10th Standard and I saw a newspaper report which vividly described about the India's successful launch of SLV-3 rocket which enable to put Rohini satellite into the orbit. It praised the chief of project Dr APJ Abdul Kalam and his determination to achieve, since he was man behind the indigenous technology. At that moment he became my new role model in

1980. And I decided to become a scientist like him.'

But that dream got realised after 15 years, when he joined as Scientist in Aeronautical Development Agency (DRDO), and former President Dr APJ Abdul Kalam was the Director General of the organisation. He says, 'I met him in an event dealing with the design of the aircraft and explained my 15 year-old dream to meet him. Thereafter every week he used to visit our department in order to review the aircraft. Over period of time, a good relationship began to bloom between us. In 1998 when India conducted Pokhran nuclear tests, he came to our facility to address about the technological and economic sanctions by Western powers following tests. During the speech he explain the need to build an indigenous technology since a team of Indian scientists and engineer working in Lockheed Martin Company (UK) were sent back to India due to sanctions. Most importantly he kindled the energy within us to achieve more and make India a strong nation '

Late Dr APJ Kalam looked at broader perspective of life, when he meets young scientists he used to motivate them with courage and imbibe a sense of goal. 'He would ask 'What are you doing?' I would reply the work that is allotted 'I am working for design and developing the light combat aircraft'. But he would say No. That is the work, the vision is making fighter aircraft to defend our nation', he would always insist that we are working for bigger mission or not a small structure,' he says.

Explaining vision of late Dr APJ Abdul Kalam, he lists out that, 'after the nuclear test were successful, he was elevated to Principal Scientific Advisor to the Prime Minister, he had visualised to make India a powerful nation, and prepared a master plan and identified core structures like Agriculture-Food processing, Education, Information-Communication technology, Infrastructural development (Health, Agriculture, Rural), Self reliance on critical fields. After submitting his 'Vision 2020' document and he called me to explain his vision and spread the thoughts among the children and youth. In order to spread his message of the vision, I built entire communication systems, which enable him to connect with youth include speech and lectures, answering the emails.'

When Dr APJ Abdul Kalam became President, he asked me join him, which was quite a surprise for Ponraj. He says 'Since I had good relationship with over a period of time he asked to join as Director for technology interface at President's Secretariat through deputation (2003). Then it became a regular affair to interact with him daily. And I also started to work with him in preparing speech and drafting important documents etc.' And he was also given the task to implement e-governance in Rashtrapati Bhavan.'





6 PONRAJ RESIGNED HIS GOVERNMENT JOB TO FORM A MOVEMENT TO CARRY FORWARD THE VISION AND MISSION OF KALAM, TITLED 'ABDULKALAM VISION INDIA MOVEMENT'

From 2003 to 2016, Ponraj was working very closely with late President Dr APJ Abdul Kalam, and he describes the painful day of his life, he says, 'I am the last Ph.D (Affordable Healthcare) student of late Dr APJ Abdul Kalam. He came to attend my synopsis meet on 16th July 2015. He was holding discussion on a book titled 'Puyalai Thandinal Thendral' (When you cross the storm, there is breeze). When I was about to join him on next his speech at Bengaluru (3rd August). He passed away while delivering lecture in IIM. Whenever we used to travel in flights, he never sleeps and prepares notes for speech or lecture; sometimes passengers would ask him for an autographs or a photo, making him awake all the time. But during his last journey, while we were all awake, he had slept forever. We couldn't believe our eyes. There are no words to describe the moments.'

Ever since Dr APJ Abdul Kalam passed away, on July 27, several thousand from various walks of life were making requests through telephone and e-mails to carry for the vision of the great man. In a response to the request Ponraj resigned his government job to form a movement to carry forward the vision and mission of Kalam, titled 'Abdulkalam Vision India Movement'. Elaborating the purpose Ponraj says,' throughout his lifetime, Dr APJ Abdul Kalam was thinking about developing India, and also making each State grow to a stature of a developed country. He had advocated, addressed, propagated and given us a plan of action. For 5 years I have worked under him as Scientist and for next few years under him, working under his influence. When he dies, I must not leave the vision. In order to educate, socially aware the public and youth, I have formed the organisation, so that his vision is achieved' •

A graduate of Engineering from Indian Institute of Science, it was during the IT boom in the sector and the need for computers picked up. He joined PSI data systems in Bengaluru and later got transferred to Chennai. While he joined TCS in 1987, he started Sevalaya in 1988.

'I made up my mind long back that I will spend 25 years of my life earning for myself. After that, I will not do it. So I should be in a position where I don't need any help. That was the plan, and I thought I was right, so in 2009, I quit my job'.

In his school days, young Muralidaran spent his childhood reading books on Mahatma Gandhi, Swami Vivekananda, and Mahakavi Subramaniya Bharathiyar. From each personality, he picked up one idea, and the vision of Sevalaya was thus inspired from these three amazing leaders motivated him deeply, planting the seed of giving in him at the tender age of eleven, which has grown into a big tree called 'Sevalaya' now.

Initially, the NGO had its share of recognitions issues with minimal support from the government. But, yet, Muralidharan worked his way through with the sole motive of bringing up Sevalaya.

On being asked, how he managed to work in the IT industry and also take care of the huge responsibility of managing an NGO, he says, 'If you want to call something stressful, it can be anything. Sevalaya was my plan since school days; TCS and the IT industry are things that came in between. Whatever work I did at TCS, I related it with Sevalaya. It then became very interesting for me. If I had



to travel, I started thinking on how to attract people towards Sevalaya. I have made friends across the world, thanks to TCS who still contribute to Sevalaya.

The global exposure I got from work played a major role in helping me working towards the growth of Sevalaya. I always had Sevalaya pamphlets with me to distribute when I meet someone new. Many foreigners were interested and they visit the campus when they come to India. They financially contribute as well. Also, TCS is a very well-known organisation that provides a lot of training in skill development, Quality development, Quality delivery, how to handle customers and all these skills, I incorporated those in Sevalaya'.

'I never think of it as a 7 day work schedule a week. Instead, it is a 7 day holiday schedule. I do what I want to do, and if you love what you do, every day is a holiday'

He took his family in Sevalaya, where his wife is the honorary correspondent. The family travels to the campus every weekend, and thus family time, was with Sevalaya as well. Time flew, and his children grew up who had their own needs to attend to.


Starting with just five children, in a small rented house with ₹50 as a monthly rental, no electricity in a very small village, Sevalaya now houses in its school campus that educates children from Little Kinder garden to the twelfth grade educating 2037 students in 40 villages, all from orphaned or economically deprived families, for free. It also houses 75 elderly people in its old age. Apart from this, Sevalaya also does organic farming and teaches organic farming to the peasants and farmers

'We want our children in school to know that just because a cow stops producing milk, doesn't mean you cut and eat t. It is injustice being done to them. This also applies to old age homes. When the parents are young enough to earn money, children take it from them and use it. But, once they grow old, they throw them out of the house. This is done for so many other things and is humanely wrong'.

It is his sheer dedication and hard work towards societal service that has now rendered him a lot of recognition among people, giving him many accolades and awards such as the Best Social Worker for women's welfare, presented by the government of Tamilnadu in 2016, Spirit of Humanity for education in 2015, in a National forum, Best old age home in Tamilnadu to name a few from a list of over 60 awards.

With trademarks already set, and aiming for more, with the sole purpose of societal benefit and welfare, Muralidharan has clearly set himself class apart from the others. ◆

THE MAGICAL CREATOR

THE MAN WHO NEEDS NO INTRODUCTION, LIFE JUST BROUGHT HIM TO WHERE HE IS NOW AND THERE IS NO TURNING BACK. THE CREATOR OF THE BEAUTIFUL PRODUCTION DESIGNS OF MOVIES LIKE 'BAAHUBALI' AND 'OM SHANTHI OM'. WINNER OF FOUR NATIONAL AWARDS, SEBASTIAN WINSTON CYRIL AKA SABU CYRIL IS DOWN TO EARTH, HUMBLE AND THE SIMPLEST PERSON YOU WOULD MEET WITH SUCH ACCOLADES AND FAME. **GAYATHRI KRISHNARAJ** PENS DOWN HIS STORY FOR AN INTERVIEW

'I would want them to know I am an art director from a creative industry. I talk about their profession, I study about everything. I like to know about everything. I go into details and ask about it. The one good thing is I find it easy to get along with people like water takes the shape of the container. I would like to be a simple person.'

Simplicity of this man cannot be explained better. He grew up in Vazhnarai, where his father was into the tea estate business. 'The houses we lived belonged to British men, so I was exposed to such architecture which gave me an advantage.' He then moved to Coimbatore for his schooling from the 8th grade and later on to Chennai, to join school of, visual communication. As a student he was very good in physics, chemistry, math and all the school subject always came up to be the topper. But, art was always a part of him. 'I was not well when I was in 6th grade. I got chicken pox for about one month that was the time I started painting and drawing. I learned drawing when my uncle who was good at sketching came to visit us. But when he move out, leaving the sketches without colour and I used the opportunity to complete the work. It was a kind of a feeling. I started drawing and painting. The craft was there in me, 'he recalls.

Sabu feels that he has been gifted genetically form both his parental sides. His maternal grandfather was a photographer for the navy and then settled down with a studio and became a drawing master. While his mother's side is filled with artists such as painters and sketch artists, his father's side relatives were prominent in singing and dancing. 'I got only 1/10 of my dad's talent' he chuckles.

In the tenth standard, when he used to go to home from his school, Sabu used to see this sign board painter paint on walls, called Anu arts. He went and asked him if he could see him painting.

"One day he told me, you can also come sit and draw, I'll tell you what to do and everything. He trained me. One day, he saw one of the sign boards and was surprised to know that I was person behind it. He encouraged me to join school of arts. But my dad was completely it me joining fine arts. I paid my fees for the first year.'

He was always first rank holder in college and received the best outgoing student award as well. It was a five years course. Art took him over. 'He told me, artists will die of poverty. I told him I'll be a commercial artist. Now, I think I did a wise decision of taking up visual communication.'

Sabu's idea was not to join the film industry. He was working as a freelancer and then set up his own agency for graphic designing. 'A friend wanted me to help finish a film. An art director became a director and he asked for help and someone suggested my name. He called me for a week and I ended up doing it for the whole film,' he says.

Talking about his experience and work in his first film, he recalls his project where he had to make an oxygen plant and for the perfectionist that he is, it was done with great detail. Everyone loved it and asked him if his parents where doctors because the oxygen plant came out so well. The director asked him to do his next movie as well. He made a miniature which Bharathan put in 'Devar magan'. Bharathan enquired his nephew about the creator behind the miniature, and Sabu was called. 'He told to create a shark and after seeing the model he asked me to complete

the entire art setup of the film. Though I refused, he gave me the confidence to be an art director. I loved his aesthetics and films. First time when I got my confidence was when he was narrating the story and asked the associate director to take me along to select the costumes. That gave me a lot of confidence to complete the movie.' Sabu explains as he becomes nostalgic.

By the time he finished this film, he got five film offers. 'I could choose which film I wanted to do. So, what can I ask for more?'.


When I am working on something, it becomes my favourite and I do my best for that. Some films have given me name, some have not, but, I have enjoyed doing all the films. It's like asking which daughter I like more. Some I like for certain things, some for another. You really can't give an overall favourite."

On asking about his journey, he says, 'I never thought anything. I never planned anything. I took up things that came my way. I never consciously looked out for anything. An all-rounder, good in studies, cultural, arts and sports, but he feels he is bad with music. 'I can't sing for nuts and I can't play any instrument. But, my daughter is good with studies, dance and can sing as well. She paints and plays instruments as well. She got the genes from both the sides I guess.'

After Baahubali 2, he has planned up two films with Prabhas and Sundar's Sanghamitra which is going to be a period film set to go on for two years. 'My hobby is my profession which is the best thing that could happen to me. When I have no work, I love to sleep. I read books if not. I don't watch films much either. I think god has been very kind to me.' •

HARDWORKING, MULTI-TALENTED AND AN AVID READER P. SAMUTHIRAKANI, AS HIS NAME SAYS HAS GIVEN SEVERAL FRUITFUL MOVIES IN HIS CREDIT. BORN TO VINAYAGAR AND KAMALAMMAL, IN AN AGRICULTURAL FAMILY AT A VILLAGE IN RAJAPALAYAM, SAMUTHIRAKANI SHARES HIS LOVE FOR CINEMA WITH AMRITHA PREM ELOQUENTLY

How did you get interest in Cinema?

I considered watching films as a mistake during my school days. But, after watching 'Mudhal Mariydhai' (one of my friends took me during night studies at school and it's my first film) at Kalieshwarari theatre, everything changed. Cinema became my life, and I started watching films everyday either by bunking school or going for night shows. This routine came to an end when I got caught. And my father refused to pay pocket money, so every night after everyone falls asleep. One day, when the movie, 'Naan Sigapu Manithan' (Starring Ranjinikanth) got released; I was super excited and got the permission from the stall owner to sell 'muruku' during the two intervals The movie ran for weeks together and all the 64 shows I watched happily. My bad luck one of my relative noticed me and I was carried back home. When my 10th standard exams got over, I desperately wanted to visit Chennai, as my favourite Directors K Bhagyaraj and T Rajendar lived at T.Nagar. In 1987, I took ₹130 from my dad pocket, carrying a diary containing the address of my favourite directors.

How was your first journey Chennai?

I got into the bus and the conductor asked me where am I going? I told Madras. He said 'thambi, Madras la enga?' (Which place in Madras (Chennai) and the passengers started mentioning names like Guindy, Saidapet etc. LIC sound familiar and I got down opposite to LIC. I asked the people about T Nagar?. I began to feel hungry I saw a grandma selling 'idly', along the roadside. She gave me idly without asking money, recognising my situation. At night, I slept near the arch of G N Chetty Road. After an hour, a policeman with latti woke me up and took me to the Police Station opposite to Spencer Plaza on his bicycle. Next day, he told me to go back

home but, I asked the T Nagar. I reached T Nagar but couldn't meet any film directors, at last befriend the watchman and stayed with him. I always say good people do exist in the world. Policeman and the grandma were the first two good people I met in Chennai. I believed in it, so I saw them. With only ₹10 in my hand, so I planned to return home. When I reached Villipuram, and hunger began to hit me and I met the owner of SLN hotel, asking me to give job describing my situation. After working for a week and got ₹35 to return to my village. On reaching my home, my pet dog Bhairava fell dead on my lap as it didn't eat for days, as I was missing. My mom, who never raised her hand, beat me. My dad convinced my mother. Though I was happy about that, the happiness didn't last, when I joined plus one, my dad passed away due to cardiac arrest. During the plus one holidays, I told my mom about my dream though she was hesitant, she sold her chain and gave ₹1800 for expenses and ₹200 she tied in her saree bit and said to use the money for returning back home.

Did you continue you studies?

I came Chennai with new energy, rented a room in Pushapa Mansion, West Mambalam for ₹175 per month. I didn't ask for any chances, but studied about cinema. Later, during holidays I started visiting Chennai until I completed my B.Sc (Mathematics). Then I decided Chennai - Cinema is my ultimate goal, but my mom was feeling in secured about my future. So I enrolled myself in civil service exams and luckily law entrance exams were announced, I cleared it and pursued B.L (1994-97), to make my mom happy.

How did you become an assistant director?

I wanted to become a comedian, but the society never treats humans in equal. I used

to entertain the Assistant and Associate directors in the lunch session as they should avoid sleeping. I played one among the college student in the movie 'Puthiya Manithargal' and in the film 'Padikkarava Vayasula', I badly wanted to talk at least one dialogue. I asked my director and that time my associate director's sandal wore out. Aiming to secure a role so that I speak a dialogue I took his sandals ran to a shop and got it stitched. Finally, I got a chance to speak a dialogue in that movie. Later, When I met Sundar K Vijayan, who was doing tele-films, on seeing my photo album he got impressed by my handwriting and asked, 'Will you come to work as an assistant copywriter', I stood still, went to my room, tore all my album pictures thinking, 'I again should not even dream of becoming an actor'. The next day I started my career as assistant director.

So how you got the chance to become a hero and friendship Sasikumar?

God doesn't come on the earth and help everyone personally, but he sends someone. God sent me M. Sasikumar. After 16 years, he told me to act in 'Subramaniapuram' in 2008, saying 'Nadika Thana Vantha, Va Nadi' (You came for acting, and now become an actor). Friendship is about not words, but it about action and expression, he is one such true friend. He was working an assistant to Ameer Sultan. Ameer appreciated me for my first film 'Unnai Charanadaindhen', when his debut movie 'Mounam Pesiyadhe' was released. Through him my friendship with Sasikumar blossomed after my movie 'Neranja Manasu' failed at box office; I joined as an associate director to Ameer to rectify my mistakes whereas Sasi started writing scripts for 'Subramanipuram'.





Tell us about your mentor and guru K Balachandar?

The good qualities that I possess now are because of him, the movies that I take now, the ideas behind it are all because of his words and teachings, I will say. My first TV serial Anni was with him and later followed my other serials like 'Selvi', 'Arasi', and 'Alaipayuthey'.

What is the most memorable moment?

The moment I met K Balachandar for the first time, and while watching movie 'Nadodigal', he held my hands tightly after every applause. He said he likes to shout in the theatre. His words: 'You're my last son, I was completely worrying about you, as you're losing, but this movie will take you great heights', remains deep close to my heart.

Where do you get inspiration for

characters?

I want my films to create social awareness among the audience and spread social message. I put my blood and soul into the films as I love my people and so my characters are real. The people who I came across and had a personal relationship with me. But, who couldn't fight against the society where given a rebirth in my movie.

Do you like the name 'Dhayalan' in specific and about Visaaranai?

Yes, I personally love it, so I asked my director M. Anbazhagan and he accepted too in the movie 'Sattai'. It's all because of Vettrimaran's hard work, I will say and I am really happy for it and this movie will get more awards apart from Oscar nomination.

After schooling, Mr.Korada was faced with the ultimate dilemma - to choose medicine or engineering. With a biology background in school, he proceeded with the former with high hopes. Despite getting admission into a medical college, he had to turn it down for a less expensive alternative. He then took to an open university and received a bachelor's degree, while juggling a full time job on hand.

After months of struggle, he got recruited as an office boy in an engineering firm while still pursuing his education. 'Education always took precedence and was a parallel activity to work in my formative years. Following graduation, I entered the corporate world and worked for numerous MNCs - Hitachi, Pfizer, Willett and Danaher. 

On this month devotees light earthen lamps in front of their houses and on the evening of Karthigai, 'Agal Vilakku' are lit and kept in front of the house, some of them also keep near the windows, balconies, verandahs etc. Many also burst crackers and celebrate the festival. Apart from this several receipe are also prepared

Pori Urundai

Ingredients

- Puffed rice 5 to 6 Cups
- \bullet Cardamom -1 or 2
- Jaggery ½ Cup
- Ghee and water as per requirement

Method

- First, powder the jiggery and add water in a steel bowel until it develops and heat it.
- Filter the jaggery in a cloth or metal strainer to remove impurities.
- Add cardamom to it, now heat the liquid until it reaches at adequate temperature.
- Make small ball out it, must not be too hard too, you should be able to press it.
- Now add puffed rice slowly and mix it.
- Puffed rice and jiggery mixture should not stick in your hands. If it is too sticky, then you add more puffed rice to it and mix again.
- Now apply ghee in both your hands and roll tightly into balls as per your wish.
- Entire receipe takes around 30 minutes, while preparation time is 15 minutes.





Ingredients

- Raw rice 1/2 Cup
- Par Boiled rice (Puzhungal Arisi)- 1/2 cup
- Tur dal 1/2 cup
- Bengal gram/channa dal 1/4 cup
- Urad dal 1 tbsp
- Green chilli -2
- Red chilli -3
- Ginger -1 small bit
- Asafoetida/hing -1/4 tsp
- · Salt as required
- Oil for making adai (sesame seed oil preferable)

Ingredients for the batter

- Onion -2-3 finely chopped
- Coconut -2 tbsp grated
- Curry leaves little
- Grated carrot -1/2 carrot (optional)
- Drumstick leaves -handful (optional)

Preparation method

- Soak rice and dal together for 4- 5 hours.
- Grind it coarsely along with red chilli, green chilli, ginger, hing and salt. The batter should not be thick nor it must be watery.
- · Add finely chopped onions, few tender curry

leaves, grated coconut and drumstick leaves to the batter. Adai batter is now ready.

Cooking Method

• Take a non stick tawa and pour the batter and spread it in circular motion. Add a tsp of oil around the 'Adai'. Make 3-4 holes with the back of the ladle and drizzle little oil on the holes also. Let it get cooked. Once cooked, flip it over to the other side and drizzle another tsp of oil around the 'Adai'. Let it get cooked. After both sides are cooked well, remove from tawa and serve it hot with chutney.

Appam

Ingredients

- Raw rice 3/4 cup
- Grated coconut 1/2 cup
- Cardamom powder -1/4 tsp
- Grated jaggery 1 cup
- Wheat flour 1/4 cup + 1 1/2 tbsp
- · Oil for frying

Method


- Soak the raw rice for at least 1-1/2 hours.
 Drain the water completely and grind the rice first in a mixie.
- Add little water, grated coconut, cardamom powder and grind it to a smooth paste.
- You can rinse the mixie with 2 tbsp of water and add to the batter.
- Add grated jaggery to it and mix well till it dissolves.

Cooking method

- Add wheat flour and mix well. The appam batter should be of dosa batter consistency, so adjust accordingly.
- · Batter need not ferment the mixture, and

- you should make appams immediately after grinding it.
- Heat oil in a small tawa, keep it in medium flame
- Take a small amount of batter in a table spoon or small ladle and drop it gently into the oil.
- When it puffs, turn over and cook the other side also till golden brown. Drain the oil using a slotted ladle and take it out from the kadai.
- Deep fry one appam at a time.





Kadalai Urundai

Ingredients

- Peanuts 1 cup
- Jaggery -3/4 cup
- Cardamom powder and Dry ginger powder as per requirement
- Ghee or rice flour (little)

Preparation method

- Roast peanuts nicely and remove the red skin completely,
- After roasting, break peanuts into two using your palms

Method

• Take jaggery in 100 ml of water on tawa and

heat it

- When it boils, filter the jaggery to remove impurities.
- If required add cardamom powder or sukku powder
- Take hot jiggery and pour it on the peanuts
- Mix it well with the back of the ladle. When it is warm, make even sized balls out of the mixture.
- In case, if the mixture harden, when you are making balls, you can also reheat it again for a few seconds and continue to make balls when the mixture is warm.
- Total time for preparation is 15 minutes, cooking time takes around 20 minutes

ORIGIN

Binaural beats were originally discovered in 1839 by physicist Heinrich Wilhelm Dove. 

You would normally apply painter's tape to trim, along flooring or at one end of a wall to protect such things from paint when you are giving a room fresh coat or two. Since it's designed for wall application, you can safely use it on stable wall finishes to temporarily fix lightweight party decor in place

TEST IT

Before you proceed to stick tape from floor to ceiling or in multiple areas to hold your decorations in place, perform a test run. Apply a small amount of tape to the wall in a place that may be more compromised, say, on a wall that's bombarded daily with direct sun. Press the tape firmly to the wall, and then proceed to remove it. If the wall's surface doesn't show signs of damage and the tape appears clean, you're likely good to go. When applying your choice of tape to hold decorations in place, don't use any more than necessary -- the less you use, the less wall material will pull off, should it peel -- and don't press it in place any firmer than necessary.



REMOVAL METHOD

Let's say your party is planned for the afternoon of the following day. You'd probably like to get the decorations up the morning of or even the night before everyone arrives. But don't. The longer some tapes sit in place, the more stuck they become from the home's changing temperature, sun flowing in through windows and the adhesion process itself. When possible, leave the decorations -- at least the ones that you'll be hanging with tape -- until the last hour or two. Then, as soon as everyone has left, slowly, gingerly peel the tape from the walls. If any residue remains, gently wipe it from the walls with warm, soapy water and a soft cloth. If paint pulls up in spots, touch up the walls with the same color and sheen-level of paint. As for improperly applied paint, old wallpaper or any brittle, wall surface, tacks or a gentle, rubbery, wall gum designed not to stain may be a better option than tape of any sort.



ON THE WALLS

Decorating walls with washi tape is the perfect idea for those who like creativity and constant change. Washi tape doesn't stick permanently to the wall, neither affects its structure, so it is easy to remove and replace. Posters and photos adorned with such easy-to-make frames will look just phenomenal. All you need to make your wall exceptional is a little imagination and colourful washi tape. Apart from photos, one can also use them for your favorite posters and newspaper clippings! This is probably the most trivial use of the washi tape. But, all in all, it is so very different from hanging pics and photos with a transparent or double-sided tape. And it has its unique advantage - it doesn't leave a slightest trace of glue on the wall. This is all in terms of wall decorating. But this is not the end: below you will find a few inspiring ways of decorating other objects of everyday use. The truth is that washi tape will enhance everything!

GIFTS AND STATIONERY

Alot of things can be done using washi tape, one can wrap a gift in simple wrapping paper — white or brown kraft , paper works great — then go to town using washi tape in the same way you would use ribbon. Don't be afraid to mix and match different tapes, widths and designs. Let washi tape help keep you organized — put it to work in on your calendar or day planner in the same way you'd use a highlighter. Many washi tapes are quite transparent, so you can use a little tag of tape to draw attention to important dates. Try putting down a piece of washi, then using a permanent pen to write on top of it. Your calendar is going to look gorgeous.

ON STAIRS

Give your stairs a makeover with some thick washi tape. Go modern with a black and white color combo, or channel your inner-child and go for all of the colors in the rainbow. The possibilities are endless — and totally removable! •


n life, we as women have always been taught to be modest about our achievements. At any time that we show any signs of talking about our accomplishments, we are accused of 'showing of'.




their own way which was really helpful'.








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All for the Sparrow

SPARROWS ARE SMALL, PLUMP, BROWN-GREY BIRDS WITH SHORT TAILS FOUND IN MANY URBAN AND RURAL PARTS OF INDIA. THIS CUT LITTLE BIRD IS NOT ONLY A PART OF THE INDIAN ANIMAL KINGDOM, BUT ALSO GOT REPRESENTED IN LITERATURE, MUSIC AND ART. WE MUST NOTE THAT THE HARVEST AND THANKSGIVING TAMIL FESTIVAL OF 'PONGAL', FOR INSTANCE, IS ALL ABOUT SHARING NATURE'S BOUNTY IN THE FORM OF A RICH HARVEST OF CROPS AND MILK WITH OTHER LIFE FORMS SUCH AS THE COW AS ALSO THE CROWS AND SPARROWS. parrow has been the subject of research of the British ornithologist, Dr J Denis Summers-Smith, who has been studying the various species of sparrows for the past 60 years. And though the sparrow specialist has to his credit five books on the bird species, he has been more than just an academic researcher. The Guisborough resident's love for the cute little bird has translated into a large eclectic collection of sparrow memorabilia. Interestingly, Dr Summers-Smith is a mechanical engineer, not

a biologist, but it was his interest in and love of sparrows that got him so immersed into studying the many species of sparrows.

Starting out with his study of the house sparrow in 1947 in England, Dr Summers-Smith went on to document his findings on the various habits and habitats of the bird. His first book The House Sparrow was published in 1963, after which he came out with The Sparrows: A Study of the Genus Passer, In Search of Sparrows, The Tree Sparrow and


On Sparrows and Man over the next four-plus decades.

Sparrow lovers would love to have his books. But Dr Summers-Smith points out, 'Getting hold of my books can be a problem as they are currently not in print. However, most are available as PODs (print on demand). If you cannot obtain them through an Indian bookshop, you could try to get in touch with Bloomsbury Publishing PLC, UK or the Thersby Group, UK.'

For the love of this little bird, the British ornithologist, has travelled to Asia, the Americas, Africa, Australia, New Zealand and the Cook Islands and, of course, across Europe 'in quest for sparrows'. Recounting Dr Summers-Smith, in the editorial to the September 2016 issue of British Birds, about sparrows, 'I have now watched them in more than 70 countries, from sea level in Tierra del Fuego to over 2,000 metres in the Himalayas; from a dentist's chair in Newbury to 340 metres below ground in Frickley Colliery in Yorkshire, where a pair successfully reared three young. They still surprise and fascinate me.'

And he goes on to narrate interesting instances related to sparrows. 'In 1950, a group of sparrows hitched a lift on a ship from Bremerhaven, Germany, and disembarked on reaching Melbourne, in Australia. A young bird, boarded Pan Am Flight 811 from Los Angeles to Sydney on 4th July (US Independence Day) in 1981, but was unlucky in that it was promptly dispatched by the Australian Quarantine and Inspection Authorities. Another was killed at Lord's, the home of cricket, by a fast delivery from Jahangir Khan in a match between the MCC and Cambridge University on 3rd July 1939. It can be seen, mounted on the match ball, in the Memorial Gallery'.

India too was a regular destination on his travels. Dr Summers-Smith says, 'I used to visit India fairly frequently, not only for sparrows, but also professionally, as a mechanical

engineer.' And he was in touch with the wellknown Indian environmental organization, the BNHS (Bombay Natural History Society), and made field trips in the country.

Dr Summers-Smith also has a collection of various works of literature and art on the sparrow. 'I have a collection of over fifty poems, both ones solely about sparrows and ones in which sparrows receive some mention. These are written in English, with a few in other European languages (mainly

German). I even received a poem about myself from an Ojibwa sqaw (a native American). I also have an American book Haiku on the Sparrow. I collect anything I can about sparrows including myths, fairy stories and folklore, with a number from the Indian Subcontinent translated into English (The Crow and the Sparrow, The Selfish Sparrow and the Houseless Crows, The Death and Burial of Poor Hen-Sparrow). My collection of books on sparrows now stands at 79 in 12 different languages, besides over five thousand

published papers on sparrows,' he says.

Besides literary and academic works on the sparrow, he also has an art and philatelic collection with sparrow as the theme. 'I also have a collection of copies of paintings by a variety of artists, including both Chinese and Japanese. My collection of postage stamps with images of sparrow stands at 38. The walls and flat surfaces in my house are covered with things relating to sparrows,' he reveals.

When queried about the fall in the number of sparrows. He says that many factors such as electromagnetic radiations from mobile tower masts, destruction of open grasslands, excessive use of insecticides and pesticides and growing of exotic crops and garden plants have all contributed to the lack of nesting places and food for sparrows. Dr Summers-Smith points out in the editorial to British Birds, pollution in urban areas caused by automobiles that is perhaps affecting sparrows greatly. He writes, 'it is, in my view, a potentially hugely important research area, not only for the sparrows - much as I love them - but for a range of other urban wildlife as well as for the children of our own species.'

As an ornithologist who has studied the sparrow's behaviour over some six decades, he says of his continuing engagement with the bird, 'Of course, I shall continue watching my favorite bird, the house sparrows, but merely for my own interest, no longer embarking on new specific studies.'

ARULMIGU SUBRAMANIYA SWAMY TEMPLE at THIRUCHENDUR

This evergreen song from the movie 'Deivam' voices the glory of Lord Subramanya in the ever amazing temple at Tiruchendur, on the shores of the Bay of Bengal near the southern part of our country. This is the second of the six temples dedicated to Lord Murugan in the category of 'Aarupadai Veedu' and interestingly the only temple on the seashore, while the rest being on top of hills - RAJEE MANI



ne of the richest, most popular kshetras, this temple for Lord Subramanya is located in the district of Thoothukudi on the beach of the Bay of Bengal. It can be reached by road from almost all important towns. Situated about 40 kms from Thoothukudi, and 60 kms south-east from the major railway

junction Tirunelveli, the nearest airport is either Thoothukudi or Trivandrum.

THE TEMPLE

It is claimed that the temple was built 2000 years ago, and it is considered the classic example of Dravidian architectural excellence. Slowly expanded through the ages to the

present massive proportion, it is said to have been constructed by saints and siddha purushas. The 133 feet tall Rajagopuram is built on the shore side, just within 200 meters of the roaring ocean. Because of its geographical positioning, there is no entry from the east. The sannidhi street on the western side is one of the longest in south India.



On the eastern side, there is an exclusive area cordoned off for the holy dip of the devotees. There is also salt free water well [Nazhi Kinaru] for the pilgrims to take a fresh bath after the dip in the ocean. As one stands on this shore with the glorious temple behind and the breathtaking sunrise in front, our mind almost touches the tip of divinity.

THE LEGEND

The sthalapuranam of Thiruchendur as mentioned in the Skanda purana is a popular story. One of the mighty asuras by name 'Soora Padman' along with his brothers started terrorising three worlds after he received extraordinary boons from Lord Siva. The Devas took asylum at the lotus feet of Lord Siva. But Soora could only be vanquished by the combined powers of Shiva and Shakti. Hence by the will of Providence, six sparks from the third eye of Shiva merged with the thejas of holy river Ganga to become six babies. These babies were brought up on the banks of the Ganga by six beautiful women representing the star Krithika. Eventually the six babies were moulded into one by Mata Parvati and given the name Kartikeya. So it was that Lord Subramanya was ordered now by Lord Siva to wage a war against Soora to destroy him. Skanda goes to Tiruchendur along with his chieftain Veerabagu. The battle lasts for six days and after destroying 'Soora Padman' clan in five days, Skanda wages a

terrible war on the sixth day on the shores of this sea. Finally the demon is vanquished when Subramanya's spear splits him into two halves as he stood amidst the waves in the form of a mango tree. But in the end when the wicked asura repents his sins, Lord Murugan pardons him and transforms one half into his 'vahana' peacock and takes the other half' rooster' - as the emblem of His flag.

FESTIVALS

'Nithya poojas' are performed in strict adherence to agama rules by a big team of well trained hereditary priests. Huge crowds of pilgrims throng the Kshetra even on ordinary days. Countless devotees gather at Tiruchendur for a darshan of Lord Murugan on special festive days like 'Vaikasi visakam', 'Aadi Karthigai', 'Karthigai Deepam', 'Panguni Uthiram'. So exclusive to kaumaram [cult of skanda worship]. But the Maha Kanda Sashti celebrated for 12 days in the month of Aippasi [October-November] is the Festival of Festivals. A must see event in Tiruchendur. The utsavam starts on the day of Prathama, the day after Diwali and the 'Soorasamharam' is literally acted out on the shores of the temple on the 6th day (i.e Sashti). Besides being a highly spiritual happening, it is also a great event as an entertainment for the children. In addition to the joy of total festivity, pilgrims young and old, enjoy the drama of 'Soorasamharam' as it is acted out year after

year. As 'Soorapadman' had got a boon that every time he is beheaded, he should be given another head, the drama's main agenda would be that each time Murugan chops his head with one of His weapons Sora's effigy is replaced with another one....till he turns himself to a tree and the climax is staged!

Well! This is the way traditions and religious beliefs are passed on through generations. On this occasion, thousands and thousands of devotees observe the necessary fasting and rituals and come here carrying 'kavadis' on their shoulders to be deposited at the feet of the idol at the 'garbha gruha'. The 7th day is the auspicious wedding celebrations of Lord Subramanya with Valli and Deivanai. The last five days, Lord Murugan is said to be performing Poojas to Lord Siva. The awe inspiring slogan shouted in unison by the bhaktas - 'Vetri vel Muruganukku Arogara' gets submerged in the dark waters of ocean, the azure canopy of the sky and the brown sands of the earth.

IDOL

Lord Subramanya is also known by other names like Senthil Andavan and Jayanthinathan. The presiding deity Subramanya at the sanctum sanctorum is the perfect personification of thejas, valour, triumph and karunya. He stands victoriously with the 'Vetrivel' (spear) in His Hand, after having destroyed the ego of the evil in 'Soorapadman'. The magnetic presiding diety is tall and made of black granite. Mostly he adorns the traditional Veshti and the silver kavacham on important occasions. The rudraksha mala,the Vibhuthi and Kumkuma on the forehead accentuate the radiance of His swaroopa.

It was given to Jagadguru Adi Sankara to eulogize the keerthi of the magnificent idol of Lord Subramanya at Tiruchendur in his Subramanya Bhujangam.

"Na Janami Shabdam, Na Janami Ca-Artham; Na Janami Padyam, Na Janami Gadyam Cid-Eka Ssadda Ayaa Hrdi Data-Te Me Mukhaan-Nihsarante Girash-Ca-Api Citram"

[(Salutations to Sri Subramanya) I know neither Words, nor their Meaning, And I know neither Poetry, nor Prose, but within the Core of my Heart, I see the Conscious effulgence of your six faces, which is making these various words pour forth through my mouth.]

Such has been the power of the Murthy and Kshetra at Tiruchendur from time immemorial. ♦

This trend has totally terrified the future bridegrooms and many of them prefer to remain single for the rest of their lives, which is not a good sign of course.

Who is responsible for this? Yes some women do it for the sake of wealth and luxury, at the cost of their daughter's life. Irrespective of the status in society, this disease is slowly eating away the institution of marriage. Many celebrities including actors and industrialists are silently undergoing this torture by few women folk and it is dangerously shameful for the society and community as a whole.

Even though this trend appears to be a family problem, it has assumed the gigantic proportion of a social problem, as there is no institutional or organisational control over these developments. Many values of family life and social ethos have been left under the carpet and even parents have gone wrong.

The system of education has failed to include moral aspect among boys and girls.

The judicial approach in this problem has been one sided, supporting the cause of girls and women, with a sense of prejudice against men. So the entire approach towards such an issue should be subject to review and revision. Many judgements in India have leaning in support of westernised culture which derailed social system. In his famous book titled, 'Marriage and Morals', Bertrand Russell has highlighted that Indian system of married life is the best in the world. Unfortunately, we have not yet realised and created the impact or awareness on our children about our system. In the name of equality and women's' lib, the men are getting exploited and deserted. It is the duty of the mothers to properly advice their daughters that marriage is a sacred institution and not a commercial enterprise to earn money like this by illegal methods. ♦


VIJAY SETHUPATHI TO ROMANCE TRISHA




SHAH RUKH KHAN STEALS THE SHOW

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




